Farm Pointers

A 6-pound hen laying 144 eggs in a year produces about three times her body weight, and one laying 240 eggs produces about five times her own weight. For such hard work a hen must be vigorous and in the best of health. Vigor is indicated by a bright, full eye, bright red comb and wattles, a well-developed body and strong, well-placed legs. A poor layer usually has a dull eye, narrow beak and head, an extremely long and narrow back, weak abdominal muscles, and sometimes weak legs.

To keep butter from sticking to paddles and other utensils these should be thoroughly rinsed immediately before using, first with hot water, then with cold water. This fills the pores of the wood with water and prevents the butter sticking to it. Wooden utensils should be cleaned immediately after using so that the fat will not have an opportunity to get into the pores of the wood.

Pearse sawdust is a good extinguisher of oil fires, especially if the oil is in a deep container. Poured on burning oil, the sawdust floats and smothers the fire by shutting off the oxygen. Care must be taken that the sawdust does not become oil soaked and as dangerous as the oil itself. Two or three pounds of common soda mixed with a bucketful of sawdust makes it almost entirely incombustible. On a very hot fire the soda gives off a gas which aids in smothering the flames.

Air leaks will cause loss of money by build. It is now time for the auto to be made ready for the new crop. A careful check should be made to see that it is airtight.

After the fall is two weeks old give it access to plenty of fresh, clean water at all times, and when cold enough to eat roughage, see that it always is available. The cold water even though it does drink milk.

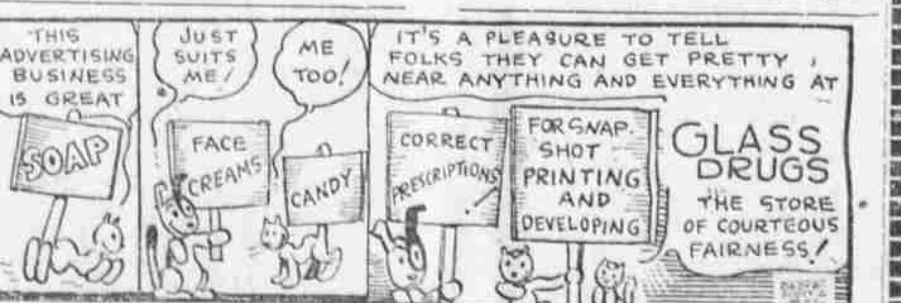
