DEMPSEY TO FIRE AT TUNNEY'S EYE

Ex-Champion Declared Physically Perfect—Gene is Resting

LINCOLN FIELD, CRETE, Ill., Sept. 8. (AP)—The novelty of a scheduled daily interview with Jack Dempsey, after the White House manner, proved a bit too bizarre in the initial meeting, even in such veterans of the interview as Dempsey and the sports writers.

The half-hour conference yesterday made both better acquainted, but Mr. Dempsey himself asked most of the questions. The newspapermen filed out with little more than the statement that the former champion expected to take full advantage of the accidental eye sore Gene Tunney's eye when they meet at Soldier Field.

Both Dempsey and Manager Flynn were delighted with the results of their first workout in private with only newspapermen and a few relatives, including Oscar Ake, clustered around the ring.

Physically Perfect

Dr. Joseph Russell, representing the Illinois State Athletic commission, confirmed Dempsey's own view of his condition, pronouncing the former champion physically perfect. Jack weighed 175 when he met on the scales for the doctor, about four pounds more than he plans to weigh Sept. 22.

Light, fast sparring partners with one or two heavyweights to knock up the mitt session, was the prescription of Flynn for the former champion again today. Starting with Ted Morgan, junior heavyweight champion, Dempsey carried five rounds yesterday with sparring mates, using up two in one round. Five miles of road work in the morning and two rounds with the light and heavy bags just before the boxing lessons, complete the program for

the next three days.

TUNNEY RESTS

LAKE YLLA, Ill. Sept. 8. (AP)—Gene Tunney decided today that he would not box after all and would give his injured right eye at least another day to heal properly.

The respite marked the third day the heavyweight champion has rested since Chuck Wiggins, Indianapolis, light heavyweight, opened a cut in Gene's eyelid in a sparring session Tuesday. Tunney would not say when he planned to pull on the 16 ounce training gloves again, although it appeared probable that workouts would be resumed tomorrow.

Having no worries over his physical condition, Gene is not disturbed by the break in training and waits at Jack Dempsey's indication of playing for the injured eye in their return battle at Soldier Field Sept. 22.

"It's just a scratch and will heal in a week," the titleholder said today. "I could box again today if I wished but with so much at stake I think it best to take no chances. There is always the possibility of another bid that would do no harm to Dempsey. Dempsey will find my eye in shape to receive all the pounding he can give it."

Tunney played 15 holes of golf as a training stunt yesterday. He was accompanied by Eddie Bagat, of Denver, a former captain of the Yale boxing team and Rhode Islander. Road work was omitted for the day.

Present indications are that Steffen will be forced to plan an attack radically different from that used in the last years. 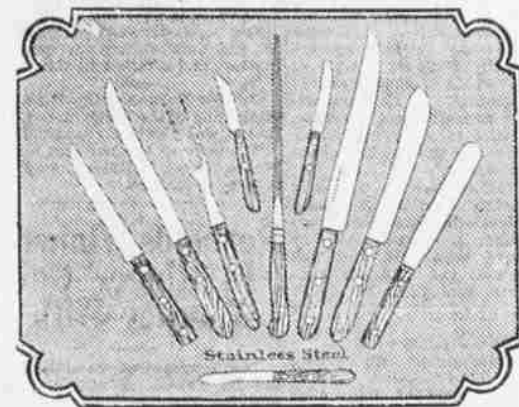
