Missionary Club Of Presbyterian Church in Meet

The Women's Missionary society of the Presbyterian church met yesterday afternoon at 2:30 p.m. at the home of Mrs. O. E. Morin at 308 Third street. Assisting Mrs. Morin as hostesses for the afternoon were Mrs. C. E. Anderson, Mrs. Robert Miller and Mrs. William Miller.

About 25 members of the society were in attendance. Devotional services were held by Rev. J. George Wain, who called for short scripture readings from each member. A business meeting was held during which plans for missionary programs during the month of November in commemoration of the 125th anniversary of the society were presented by the Rev. J. George Wain. Several business matters were transacted and plans were discussed for the winter activities. Mrs. L. A. Wain then gave an interesting talk to the members of the society upon her experiences in Madagascar when, with Mr. Wain, pastor of the Lutheran church of La Grande, did missionary work on the island. Mrs. Wain explained that because of illness brought on by the climate she was compelled to leave the island after about three years, but that Mr. Wain completed his missionary work of five years on the island. Her narration of conditions on the island was gleaned from personal observation. Mr. Wain then spoke, carrying on the story of Madagascar and giving statistics to show the remarkable improvements which have been made upon the island, both commercially and socially, in the past few years. The comparison was especially interesting in the means of transportation which were provided when Mrs. Wain was on the island and the means which now are obtainable.

At the close of the program the hostesses served refreshments.

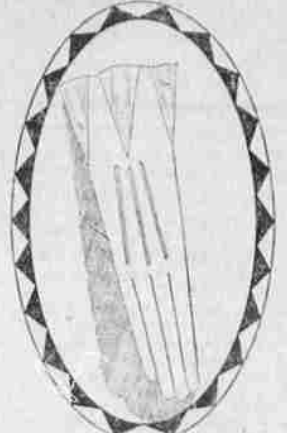

MENUS

By Sister Mary

BREAKFAST—Cantaloupe, oatmeal, cream, poached eggs on toast, milk, coffee.
LUNCHEON—Tunahead, potato chips, brown bread, blackberries, cranberry, red cocoa.
DINNER—Veal pot roast with browned potatoes and carrots, lettuce Waldorf salad, plum, tart, milk, coffee.

The fish mold suggested in the luncheon menu is served on a bed of lettuce with a garnish of sliced tomatoes. This combines the salad and meat course attractively for an informal meal.

Jellied Waldorf Salad
Two tablespoons granulated gelatin, 1/2 cup cold water, 1-2 cups boiling water, 1-2 cups lemon juice, 1-2 cup sugar, 1 cup diced tart apples, 1 cup diced celery, 3-4 cup broken nut meats, 1-4 teaspoon salt.
Soften gelatin in cold water for ten minutes and when dissolved stir in gelatin. Stir until

gelatin is dissolved and let stand until cool and beginning to set. Add lemon juice and salt. Stir in apples, celery and nut meats and turn into individual molds or one large one. Chill eight to twelve hours. Unmold on a bed of lettuce and serve with French dressing or cooked salad dressing as preferred.

Town Taxes Girls With Short Hair

BERLIN, (AP)—If women want to wear shingled hair, they shall be made to pay for it, is the decision of the municipality of Wartenburg in East Prussia.

A tax of 12 marks per year has been imposed on every shingled girl. Girls up to 15 years of age are exempt, but married women who have sacrificed their locks have to pay double tax.

Other townships are preparing to follow suit in tapping this new source of revenue. At Schoenau, the tax is 20 marks per year up to 20 years of age, and 30 marks after.
