BIG BILL LOSES TO FRENCH STAR

Lacoste Trims American In Davis Cup Series—U. S. Hopes Dimmed

GERMANTOWN, C. R. C. K. E. T. C. (AP)—The Bill Tilden fell before the machine-like attack of René Lacoste today and American hopes of defending the Davis cup dwindled as France scored the score at two all. Lacoste hammered out his second triumph of the series by the decisive score of 6-3, 4-5, 5-2.

Lacoste's triumph left the fate of the cup depending on the outcome of the fifth and final match between Billie Jean and Henri Cochet. Only a miraculous comeback by the Californian, it seemed, could prevent another French victory that would end America's seven-year winning streak in the premier prize of tennis over seas.

Tilden crushed under the strain of trying to carry virtually the entire burden of defense. Victor Tilden, previously, he found it impossible to lift the game to top notch for the third day in a row against such opposition as Lacoste furnished. It would have taken Tilden at his best to overcome René's superlative steadiness, craft and control, but Billie was far from the form he had shown in defeating Cochet and in leading the doubles victory with Frank Hunter yesterday.

Tilden made a fight for it for the first two sets only he seldom had his level edge even in these sets. In the last two he tired and was an easy victim of Lacoste's shifting play and accuracy. The 23-year-old French youth outplayed and out maneuvered his veteran nearly all the way.

Search Fruitless—Mendocino, a fruitless search went on for the American monophane Old Glory and the Canadian monophane Sir John Carling. Long missing in attempted flights eastward over the Atlantic.

The flight of the Royal Windsor to England was definitely abandoned today and V. A. "Duke" Schiller, the pilot, wired the Windsor flight committee from Harbor Grace, N. E., that he and Phil Wood, co-pilot, would return here "as soon as possible."

The telegram was in answer to a message sent to Schiller yesterday directing the return of the flyers. Schiller said he would build the plane, but he might be asked to start out in search for the missing Old Glory or the Sir John Carling.

Funk To Give Up Trip—Captain Rene Funk, of New York said his projected flight to Paris probably had been abandoned for this season, after the navy department revoked the leaves of absence granted Lieut. Lawrence Curtin and Edwin V. Edwards, navigator and radio operator, respectively, on the proposed jump.

A request for ships to outfit the route mapped out by William S. Brock and Edward F. Schiller for their journey from the United States across the Pacific on their round the world flight in the Pride of Detroit, was refused by Admiral Navy Secretary Robinson, who said no ships were available.

The Detroit board of commerce called Brock and Schiller urging them to abandon their transatlantic plans.

Coolidge Speaks—President Coolidge at Rapid City let it be known that while he intends to investigate transatlantic flying circumstances with the hope of establishing greater certainty for them, he can hardly see a government board willing to take the responsibility for any transatlantic flights.

Meanwhile in this country, Canada and in Europe sentiment against transatlantic flights gained supporters.

Motion Picture Companies War Over Location

CEDAR CITY, Utah, Sept. 10. (AP)—Armed warfare has been declared by two rival motion picture companies of Hollywood seeking to film scenes in the vicinity of Inspiration Point, at Cedar Breaks, one of the most picturesque in Southern Utah.

Arriving "on location" with his company of actors, Edwin Carewe found the place occupied by the Ruggell company who were busily engaged in filming scenes for another picture. Carewe alleged that the Ruggell company had moved in on their site, which to date has been untouched by moving picture cameras.

The Ruggell company refused to vacate and on the threat of the Carewe company to take the place by force established an armed picket of 30 men about their camp. With sawed off shot guns and revolvers, the guards yesterday and today watched the two roads leading to the Ruggell location while the company worked. Today the guards were reinforced by a squad of men from the office of Sheriff J. T. Leach of Iron county, who contends that the Carewe company has no right to the location until the Ruggell company is through.

More American Marines Taking Up Bandit Trail

MANAGUA, Nicaragua, Sept. 10. (AP)—More American marines are being sent to the bandit-infested regions of the department of Nueva Segovia. It is reported from Nueva Segovia that bandits brutally murdered three farmers by cutting off their heads. The farmers' haciendas then were burned. American marines engaged in another skirmish with bandits north-east of Somoto, near the Honduran border, Thursday. Four bandits were killed and six wounded, two seriously. The marines who captured considerable ammunition, arms and supplies, suffered no casualties.

Leviathan Heads For France With 1610 Legionnaires

NEW YORK, Sept. 10. (AP)—Escorted to sea by naval detachments, this country's greatest wartime transport ship, the Leviathan, left for France today with a contingent of 1610 members of "The second A. E. F." headed by the old war commander, General John J. Pershing, en route to the American Legion national convention in Paris.

In contrast to the days when the giant liner was a camouflaged troop ship bearing a grim cargo of khaki-clad doughboys "over there," the Leviathan's departure today was accompanied by the carefree music of brass bands, the waving of myriad banners and pennants, from ship and shore, and the cheery calls of those who were left behind wishing the former American warlike bon voyage and a safe return.

Where the giant liner was formerly guarded by destroyers, today she was escorted down the bay by gallantly bedecked official ships of the city of New York and the navy, overhead, shimmering in the bright sunshine, glided the dirigible Los Angeles and the non-rigid airship J-3. On the dock, smoking his famous "upside-down" pipe, Vice President Charles G. Dawes waved farewell.

The Leviathan was the last of 27 ships to sail with members of this legion and their families. Of these vessels, 18 put out for France from this port. Altogether, they carried 18,233 men, women and children bound for the convention.

Kelley Order To Wait On Appeal To State Court

BALEM, Ore., Sept. 10. (AP)—The case of Elsworth Kelley, condemned to die on the gallows for participation in the prison break of Aug. 12, 1925, whose temporary writ of habeas corpus was dismissed by Judge L. H. McMahon yesterday, has become further complicated by an order signed by McMahon staying execution of the sentence pending appeal of the state supreme court.

The order was signed yesterday afternoon at the request of Martin L. Dips of Portland, Kelley's attorney, when Dips filed an undertaking on appeal.

Rickard Announces Time of Big Fight

CHICAGO, Sept. 10. (AP)—Jack Dempsey and Gene Tunney will start swapping punches at each other between 9:45 and 10 p. m. Chicago daylight savings time.

Promoter Tex Rickard made this announcement today, in response to a flood of inquiries as to the starting time of the world's heavyweight championship fight in Soldier Field Sept. 22.

Rickard however, reserved the right to start the battle as early as 9 o'clock if threatening weather is in prospect.

CATFISH, BASS IN KINNEY LAKE

Joseph Isaak Walton League Secures 6,000 Fish From State

JOSEPH, Ore., Sept. 10.—A consignment of young fish-arrived at Joseph from one of the state hatcheries in the Willamette valley this week.

The shipment consisted of bass, catfish and crappies. There were 20 cans of the shipment and 600 young fish were deposited in the little lake on the top of the hill between Prairie creek and Little sheep.

The bringing of this type of fish to Wallawa county is something of an experiment and one that local sportsmen hope will prove a permanent addition to the fishing of the county. Bass and catfish have been propagated in the streams of the Willamette valley for many years, the conditions there being similar to middle-western and eastern states. Here, however, the attention of local sportsmen and the state game officials has been directed toward re-stocking the streams and lakes with trout. Millions of baby trout of different species have been placed in the lakes in recent years and yet the supply is little ahead of the demand. If the new fish do well in the waters of Wallawa county, a matter that will take several years to prove, it is likely that other lakes and streams not abounding in trout will be stocked with them.

Bass and catfish are something that very few local sportsmen know anything about. Those who formerly lived in the eastern states have had experience with them but the fellow who has spent his years this side of the Rockies has much to learn about them. They grow much larger in size than the native trout or any of the trout family and it is said that there is real sport in catching them.

The Joseph chapter of the Isaak Walton League is responsible for getting the new fish planted here. The chapter sent a request to M. L. Ryckman, director of hatcheries for the state fish and game commission, on August 11. Word came from him the first week that a consignment of the fish were on the way to Joseph and to be ready to receive them. Game Warden Geo. Rodgers was at the train yesterday with a truck and the cans were loaded on immediately and taken to Kinney lake.

Kinney lake was chosen because it is a shallow lake with much growth of water plants. It is claimed that fish food abounds there and the local Waltons are enthusiastic about the future fishing.
