Eight Projects Advertised By Highway Board

SALEM, Sept. 14. (AP)—Bids on eight construction projects will be opened by the state highway commission at a meeting in Portland Tuesday, Sept. 27. They are:

Harney county—Elevate miles of grading on Buchanan-Milner. This section of Central Oregon highway and Ninger Flat-Vendevor section of Burns-Otis market road.

Jefferson county—One mile of broken stone surfacing and the furnishing of 1,000 cubic yards of broken stone for maintenance purposes between Madras and trail on The Dalles-Cannonville highway.

Lane county—Three and nine-tenths miles of grading on road unit of Lowell-Goodman creek section of Willamette highway.

Umatilla county — Furnishing broken stone and crushed gravel for maintenance on Pendleton-Kamiah section of Old Oregon Trail.

Wheeler county—Seven and five-tenths miles of grading on Mitchell-Keyes creek section of Ghebo highway.

Benton county—Construction of 1 1/2 feet of pile foundation adjacent to Albany-Corvallis highway near Corvallis.

Clatsop county — Bridge over Saupeone creek on Honesdale highway 11 miles north of Mohler.

Linn county—Bridge over Blue river on McKenzie highway.
