Everybody knew that disease germs were a hard-boiled lot, but few suspected that some of them could stand boiling, as scientists have just discovered, for eight and one-half hours.

California rejoices in a bumper grape crop, which has begun to move eastward in edible and portable form. It is said to be nearly four times as large as the production in that state when prohibition went into effect, eight years ago, and commands a much higher price per ton. Accordingly there is prosperity in the grape sections, which filters pleasantly through the whole state. It is quite a change from the situation of 1919, when the grape growers were fearing ruin, and California congressmen prophesied the destruction of an industry worth \$200,000,000. The American Wine Growers' association complains no longer of the "un-American and bolshevik campaign" against the grape industry. Prohibition has worked out curiously in this respect, as in many others.

A farmer in Agar, S. D., claims the record for speed in getting grain from the harvest field to the dinner table. He cut and threshed wheat, with his combined harvester and thresher, then rushed it to a neighboring mill and had it ground into flour, and rushed it home to his wife, who made it into biscuits and served them on the table, all in 20 minutes. There's service for you! Maybe he did it, and it is doubtless something to be proud of. Yet why the hurry? Wheat doesn't spoil, and flour is better for slow grinding and thorough sifting; and though biscuits may gain by speed in handling, it's usually hot enough on a harvesting day to keep them in good condition until the farm hands get at them. Those champion biscuits were probably none too digestible, anyway. There's too much speed in this country now, especially in the preparation of meals and the eating of them. There ought to be prizes for slowness.

SAFER SEA FLYING

Airplanes of the simple, land-going type, are unsuited to ocean flying. That is the big lesson of the disastrous piling up lately in sea flights until a nation lately jubilant over its "conquest of the air" is heart sick. Many obstacles may hinder a sea flight. Many things may happen to an airplane. But if it is fitted to alight upon the sea and rest there safely for a reasonable time, when forced down, there is always hope of rescue. Recent aircraft lost on the Atlantic and Pacific were not so fitted.

The "flying boat" is the thing, says the United States navy. It helps considerably merely to substitute pontoons for landing gear, for sea flights, but that is a compromise which does not fully serve the purpose. The "seaplane" type, with the body of the plane above the water, is held inferior in seaworthiness to the "air boat," in which the plane body is a hull capable of resting in the water safely and moving through it with considerable speed just as any land plane "taxies" along the ground.

The navy has been experimenting with such craft for some time, after a lapse of interest in them which followed the war, and has now given orders to a big airplane firm for some new models of large size and great power. More is expected of them than any of their predecessors, because of the improvement of airplane engines and the perfecting of strong, light materials impervious to salt water which will be used for the construction of the hull.

It may be well to go slow in trans-Atlantic flying for a while, until these experiments have been made. They seem to point the way to safety and efficiency where lately there has been tragic failure.

Macintosh and Fitzmaurice said that they expected to reach America in 24 to 36 hours. They carried no radio equipment to record their progress but took a rubber boat with two paddles, on board and believed that they can leave their craft in this boat if they are forced down.

Just prior to taking off Captain Macintosh saw a black cat which he picked up remarking: "This is certainly an omen of good luck."

Expect Strong Winds

WASHINGTON, Sept. 16 (AP)—Captain Macintosh bucked against the winds leaving Dublin today and weather bureau experts say this probably will confine to mid-ocean. Afterwards for a time the winds may be in his favor, provided he seeks the proper levels.

The danger is, however, that he might have to fly too low to benefit by these winds. After reaching the vicinity of the Newfoundland coast conditions should improve tomorrow because westerly winds promise to dissipate the fog.

ST. JOHN, N. F., Sept. 16 (AP)

Prospects were favorable today for good flying weather in the vicinity of Newfoundland tonight and tomorrow, when the Princess Nensia is due to reach these waters. Today the sky was clear with light west winds.

Telephone Probe Will Begin Monday

Clark gave out today the question he had asked the state public service commission in regard to telephone company valuations and rates, and the answers given by the state body. The information will be used by the probe.

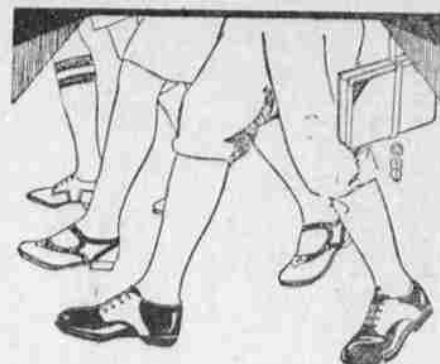

TO DEDICATE BRIDGE
