22 PLANES READY FOR AIR DERBY

Roosevelt Field Converted Into Paddock; Alive With Tension

NEW YORK, Sept. 17. (AP)—Roosevelt Field where Lindbergh, Chamberlin and Byrd started their flights to Europe, was converted again today into a paddock alive with post-tension, as 22 planes prepared to go to the barrier Monday in the New York-Spokane air derby.

Five inspectors of the department of commerce were on hand for examination of the planes which will compete for \$42,500 in prize money a share of which is sought by each 54 announced entry.

Eleven additional planes—five in class A and six in class B—reached the field yesterday while a twelfth crashed in a Pennsylvania hay field after one of its occupants had made a parachute jump to safety and its pilot had stayed with the craft as it veered to earth.

Narrow Escapes—

Captain Rumpkin earned the rank of captain as a scout and guide for white soldiers during the Indian troubles in this area. He was instrumental in bringing about peace between the redman and his white brothers. Many are the confessions he had with the white man regarding the welfare of his tribesmen.

It had been planned if possible to bring Rumpkin to the Round-Up today to appear in the parade in which he has been a figure since the inception of the spectacle.
