into the air after the flying leader, and at exactly two minute intervals thereafter, each of the remaining ten planes hopped off, on the second day of the flight.

The weather, which had threatened to be as bad as that which confronted the flyers when they left Roosevelt field yesterday morning, cleared, and the day promised good flying weather.

SECOND RACE BEGINS ROOSEVELT FIELD, N. Y., Sept. 20 (AP)—Fifteen commercial planes set out between 6 and 6:15 eastern standard time today for Spokane, Washington. In the second of these trans-continental races being held in connection with the national air races at Spokane.

H. Hudson of Marysville, Mich., taking off at 6 a. m. eastern standard time, led off in the race from this field to Wells field, Spokane, 2,175 miles away.

The planes made perfect take-offs despite the softness of the field due to heavy rains last night.

The race was completed in 16 plane duplex of varying two passengers as well as a pilot, but pilots were allowed to carry fuel instead of passengers if they choose.

The results included an overnight stop at St. Paul, Minn., and five-minute compulsory stops at Cleveland, Chicago, Aberdeen, S. D., Miles City and Butte, Mont.

Winners in the race are to be awarded the following prizes: First \$10,000; second \$5,000; third \$2,000; fourth \$1,000 and fifth \$500.

To Contest 3 Planes Three of the planes will be subject to protest upon their arrival at Spokane because rival flyers claimed they were equipped with specially curved wing tips. It was decided on Sunday to allow the three to participate in the race but the entrants in today's section of the cross-continental air derby, was forced to return an hour and a half after starting. He landed at Curtiss field, nearby. Motor trouble caused him to turn back.

R. S. Fogg, last starter today in the trans-continental air derby, landed at Leavenworth, Kan., where his engine ran out of oil, according to a telegram received by the field committee.

CHICAGO, Sept. 20 (AP)—Plane No. 16 in the national class air derby crashed here today when it ran out of gasoline, backing strong to a landing. The pilot, Louis F. Royal, of Flint, Mich., and J. F. Fire Lost \$50,000 PORTLAND, Sept. 20 (AP)—Fire destroyed two buildings of the Alaska Lumber company at the foot of Sheridan street, on the river front last night. Loss to buildings was estimated at \$15,000 and to machinery, pipe and equipment \$35,000. Crowds on the Ross Island bridge watched the fire department combat the spectacular blaze.

Box To Bring \$2,500,000 A record in gate receipts, even though the \$2,500,000 goal is not achieved was the source today of the promoters, Richard and George F. Goetz, his Chicago sponsor. They sent telegrams far and wide today to their friends with the advertisement of the previous announcement of a sell-out of rinkside seats had been optimistic. LEONARD FELLERS, CHIEF, Ill. Sept. 20 (AP)—To all outward appearances, peace prevailed in Jack Dempsey's training camp today—peace for everyone with the exception of the former world's heavyweight champion himself who was building over with nervous energy in striving control to his harried mental upset of a year ago, just before his losing battle with Gene Tunney in Philadelphia.

The Jack Dempsey of today is a changed individual. Not only is the old gleam back in Jack's eye, but much of his playfulness has returned, reminding his admirers, and even neutral onlookers, that there is as much difference between the Dempsey of today and the Dempsey of 12 months ago as there is between day and night.

The present day Dempsey, no longer worried with doubts and the menacing threats of his former manager, Jack Kearns, is more like the Dempsey of the Virgo days four years ago. The critics say he has improved 50 per cent over his mental and physical condition when he fought Tunney in the main at Philadelphia and that he is 25 per cent a better fighter than when he knocked out Jack Sharkey two months ago.

Since knocking out Sharkey Dempsey's old confidence has re-

turned dispelling all doubt in his own mind whether or not he could really come back, whether he could all but paralyze a foe with his gloved fists, and whether he could take a punching and still remain on his feet.

Dempsey is satisfied in his own mind that he will upset all prognostications and regain his prized world's heavyweight title when he meets Tunney in their battle at Soldiers Field Thursday night. His body is lean, his eyes are bright and clear, there does not seem to be an ounce of superfluous flesh on his frame.

TUNNEY ENDS TRAINING LAKE VILLA, Ill. Sept. 20 (AP)—The calmest heavyweight champion the ring has seen in many years, Gene Tunney, packed away his training gloves today and rested for his first defense of his crown Thursday night against Dempsey. Two more strolls on the road, two more brief periods with the punching bags and Tunney is ready to try to improve his superior lorry over the former title holder.

He will have no excuse to offer if defeated, the champion said today. For more than five months he has worked to build up his confidence for the battle and confidence shows in his every move and word.

The United States marine corps is organizing a reserve force to be called upon only in case of a declaration of war. Sergeant T. Shannon, marine recruiting officer with headquarters here, announces, and a call is being issued to all eligible men asking them to enroll in the corps.

Those enrolling will not be called upon to drill or to attend camp, although those who desire are entitled to two weeks training each year at the government's expense with clothing, food, medical attention and pay by making application to Washington, D. C. Boys from the ages of 18 to 21 must have their parents' written consent.
