MENUS

By Sister Mary
BREAKFAST: Cantaloupe, cereal, cream, scrambled eggs, crisp toast, milk, coffee.
LUNCHEON: Pressed corned beef, white wheat rolls blackberries with sugar and cream, chocolate cookies, milk, tea.
DINNER: Stuffed flank steak, stewed with vegetables, corn on the cob, sliced tomatoes, elderberry pie, milk, coffee.

When seasoning an elderberry pie be sure to add 1-4 teaspoon salt and 1 tablespoon vinegar to one and one-fourth cups of sugar. Mix and sift 1 tablespoon flour with the sugar. An elderberry pie must be well baked to insure thorough cooking of the fruit and a thick rich juice.



Stuffed Flank Steak
 One flank steak, 1 1/2 cups stale bread crumbs, 4 tablespoons sweet, 1-4 cup chopped cooked ham, 1-4 teaspoon pepper, 1 egg, 4 carrots, 1/2 cup sliced mushrooms, 1 tablespoon flour.
 Pound steak with wooden potato masher until as flat as possible. Press bread crumbs out of hot water. Keep hot and add salt, ham and pepper. Mix thoroughly and add egg well beaten. Sprinkle with dressing. Roll and tie firmly. Pour over boiling water to barely cover, roll and simmer one hour. Add carrots, scraped and cut in half lengthwise and mushrooms.

You remember that I told you some little time ago that coal was going to make an advance in price. Well, the advance came last night. The new price starts this morning and is \$11.50 for bit—that is the same as it has been but the price will be \$12.25 for California lump and \$12.75 for big lump. 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The Garden

MARCH BLOOM FROM SMALL ROOTS
 March may start the season of bloom in the garden. If one chooses, in all except the more northerly states by the flower use of the small bulbs. A few sunny days in March bring out the snowdrops whose tiny flowers are always welcome. Sometimes they even manage to defy frost and freeze as early as February in the north as northern Illinois.

Plant snowdrops by the hundred in some sheltered situation where a tree trunk, house, or fence will keep off the north wind and the sun has free play upon the soil and up will pop the snowdrops before any thing else is showing green. Elbow Giant is the finest of the lot, double the size of the common snowdrop.

Following the snowdrops comes the glowing blue of the squill, scilla, shibilla, and the yellow, purple, white and striped miniature bulbous of the crocus which are at their finest when expanding the lawn planted to the soil. In patches over the garden they give a very early display. They do not need deep planting. A jab into the soil sufficient to lift a piece and draw the round flat turn of the crocus underneath about two inches down will enable it to pierce its way through without trouble.

Scilla are easy to grow, increase freely and make sheets of deep rich blue in early April.

With the scilla bloom the glories of the snow, chionodoxa, with their spikes of blue purple with white stars in the center of the flower. They also colonize readily. A little later than these come the grape hyacinths in blue and white and favorites. Heavenly Blue is by far the finest of these and is a little later than the common grape hyacinth, with spikes double the size and of an intense blue that carries
