MENUS

By Sister Mary.
BREAKFAST—Pears, cereal, cream, creamed ham on toast, graham toast, marmalade, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Cream of celery soup, croquettes, stuffed peppers, brown bread, apple and rice pudding, tea.

DINNER—Broiled pork chops, scalloped potatoes, Swiss chard with mock Hollandaise sauce, chow chow, peach shortcake, milk, coffee.

If you make your own orange marmalade it can be as better or mild as you prefer by the simple method of soaking the skins for a long or short time. Many changes of water during parboiling will remove the bitter taste so objectionable to many persons.

Mock Hollandaise sauce is so good with many of the fall vegetables that the rule follows. This "mock" variety is chosen because it is cheaper and easier to make.

Mock Hollandaise Sauce.
One cup boiling water, 1 tablespoon flour, 2 tablespoons butter, 1 tablespoon lemon juice or vinegar, 1 teaspoon salt, 2 eggs (yolks), 1-2 teaspoon pepper. Melt 1 tablespoon butter and stir in flour, stirring constantly. Bring to the boiling point and boil five minutes. Remove from fire and let stand while beating yolks of eggs with salt, pepper and lemon juice. Slowly add egg mixture to sauce, beating constantly. Beat in remaining butter bit by bit keeping mixture hot over hot water. Serve at once.

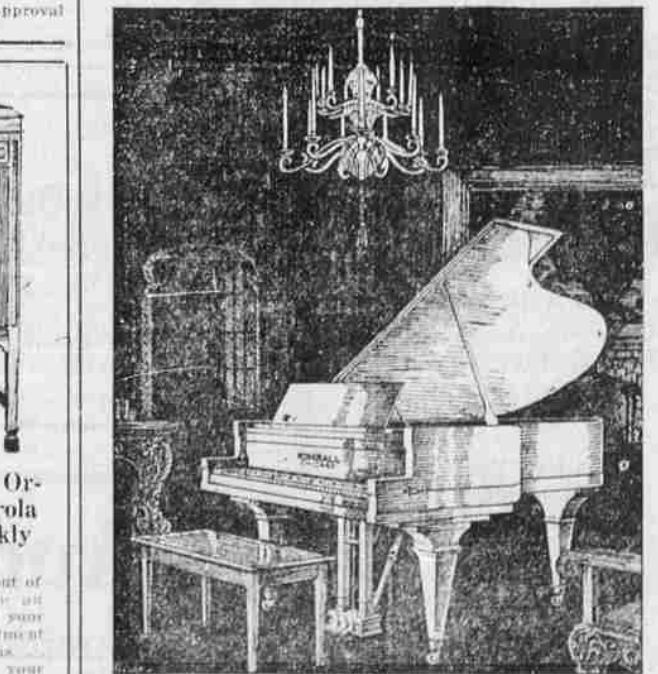

The Garden

Planting Perennials in the Fall
A large percentage of the hardy perennials may just as well be planted in the fall as in the spring, thus having a great amount of work in the early part of the year when there is always a little more than a gardener finds time to attend to. For the most part, perennials that bloom up to August 1 may be planted in the fall. This includes peonies, bleeding hearts, hollyhocks, delphiniums, pyrethrums, Shasta lilies, perennial phlox, pink and sweet Williams, rudbeckias, globe thistles and all of the small spring perennials.

Exceptions which should not be moved in the fall are oriental poppies, which should not be moved after fall root growth starts, and galatardia, which should not be moved after September 1 as they usually winter-kill after late transplanting.

All of the perennials mentioned as suitable for fall planting may be divided and reset to good advantage. Pyrethrums need dividing every third year to be at their best. In all cases of fall-planted perennials, a good mulch when the ground freezes is essential to prevent thawing and freezing during the winter, thus saving roots out of the ground.

It is an excellent idea to sow many of the perennial seeds this fall, particularly those of rather slow germination, such as primroses, delphiniums, irises, galatardia, perennial phlox and others. Late sowing of pyrethrum, Shasta daisy and pink seed will give an early start and fine plants the following season.

Particular care should be exercised to pack the earth firmly in and about the root clusters into the soil and then seeing that there is close contact with the soil. The main cultural requirement is to get root growth started before freezing weather to give an anchorage. With the perennials in place the spaces between them should be given to lilies. In fact, about the perennials, late tulips between the delphiniums, lilies to push up through the foliage of creeping phlox and pink, grateful for living mulch it gives in summer, scilla, anemones, of the snow, crocuses, grape hyacinths, snowdrops tucked in all over the garden and the spring display is ready.
