MENUS

BREAKFAST—Chilled apple
sauce, corned beef with dates,
cream, minced lamb on toast,
milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Vegetable soup,
toast sticks, orange bread and
cream cheese sandwiches, curly
cutlets with French dressing, rice
and apple pudding, milk, tea.

DINNER—Boiled mutton,
mashed turnips, casserole of sum-
mer squash with corn and toma-
toe, pears in chocolate sauce,
milk, coffee.

The luncheon soup is made with
a rich beef stock. The vegetables
are sliced or cut in matchlike
pieces and served in the broth.
This makes a hearty nourishing
dish superior to a plain thin
broth for luncheon.

Orange bread will be popular
in the school lunch box, on the
afternoon tea table, or at any fam-
ily meal.

Orange Bread
One cake compressed yeast, 1/4
cup lukewarm water, 2-4 cup
sifted orange peel, 2 teaspoons
sifted orange rind, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 2
tablespoons melted butter, 1/2 cup
white bread flour, 1 cup whole
wheat flour, yolk of 1 egg.

The water which has been
boiled and cooled to lukewarm
temperature. Dissolve yeast cake
in water. Add orange juice, sugar,
salt, grated orange rind, candied
orange peel finely chopped, melted

HEALTH

FOCAL INFECTIONS

In almost every rural community
there are patches of rough, neglect-
ed ground, perhaps covered by an-
dergrowth where "varmints" make
their homes and from which they
issue to commit depredations upon
nearby homesteads. So pieces of other
parts of a well-ordered farm.

Sturdily, there are many and vari-
ous anatomical irregularities in the
human body which afford nesting
places for many varieties of disease-
producing germs. From these nest-
ing places, germs travel through
lymph channels or in the blood to
other structures adjacent or remote
and there cause an active inflam-
mation. The anatomical part from
which these germs begin their ex-
cursions is called a point of focal
infection.

Many diseases are easily traced to
some point of focal infection. Pains
commonly called rheumatic, affect-
ing muscles or joints, are usually
due to such origin. The symptoms
of exophthalmic goiter are often
aggravated by the same cause. It
has recently been demonstrated that
stones in the kidney and ulcer of the
stomach may be due to the same
cause. That Bright's disease and con-
dylar heart disease are often due

to a focal infection has long been
well known.
It is always easier to keep out
of trouble than to get out when
once in. It is easier to prevent

are closely related to the lymphatic
system and their blood supply is
abundant. Through the chain of
lymph glands infection may be
carried into the neck and even in-
to the chest. Through the blood
vessels infection may be carried to
any part of the body.

The teeth are also frequent of-
fenders. An abscess at the root of
a tooth becomes a breeding place
for germs that enter the blood
stream and colonize distant parts
of the body. An abscess at the
root of a decayed tooth is pain-
less and gives no warning of its
presence. Pyorrhea is a disease
that often gives rise to transplanted
infections. Many persons have de-
cayed teeth filled with purulent
masses or they may have partially
denuded roots covered with pus ex-
tending from beneath the gums.
How can they put their food into
such a filthy mouth?

There are many other sources of
focal infection. The sinuses con-
nected with the nose, the mastoid
cells, the gall bladder, the appendix,
the kidneys and other organs may
become focal points of infection. It
often requires a careful and diligent
search to find the real seat of trou-
ble. The individual should not
draw the conclusion that his tonsils
should be removed or that his
teeth should be extracted. His dis-

order may arise from some other
focal point and a careful examina-
tion may be necessary to locate it.

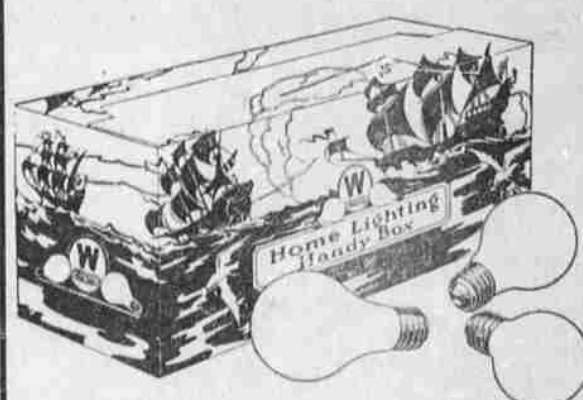
