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FEAR MILLIONAIRE MET FOUL PLAY

R. J. Reynolds, President of Air Ways Company, Missing Several Days

NEW YORK, Sept. 27 (AP)—Carter Tiffany, vice president of the Reynolds Air Ways, Inc., said today that he and his associates were "thoroughly alarmed" concerning the disappearance of President R. J. Reynolds, youthful rich and the case had been placed in the hands of a private detective agency.

"We did not feel any concern about the absence of Mr. Reynolds," he said in a statement, "until the Monday following our plane crash."

Reynolds, 21-year-old son of the late R. J. Reynolds, millionaire tobacco magnate, and one of five heirs to the \$40,000,000 Reynolds estate, disappeared September 16. On Sept. 17 a Reynolds passenger plane crashed in New Jersey with the loss of seven lives.

"The fact that Mr. Reynolds' automobile was found in the water, the Tiffany statement continued, was not particularly disturbing as we thought it had probably been stolen."

"When we did not hear from him at the beginning of the week we checked back and found that he had not kept any of his week-end appointments. We became thoroughly alarmed."

Fear of accident or foul play was inspired by the belief that he carried almost \$5000 in cash when he disappeared.

American Is Given Post on Committee

GENEVA, Sept. 27 (AP)—The council of the league of nations today voted to appoint an American on the league's permanent economic committee.

As Jeremiah Smith of Boston recently was named to the financial committee, this action places Americans on two league organizations devoted to world economic and financial reconstruction.

Shoots Man During Quarrel Over Chair

GRANT PASS, Sept. 27 (AP)—In an altercation over the ownership of a chair, George Duffield, 25, was shot through the mouth yesterday evening by C. W. Fowler at Grant Pass. It is charged by Duffield, who is in a hospital here, Officers have started for the lower league to arrest Fowler on a charge of assault with intent to kill. Duffield is in a serious condition, but it is believed he will recover.

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
