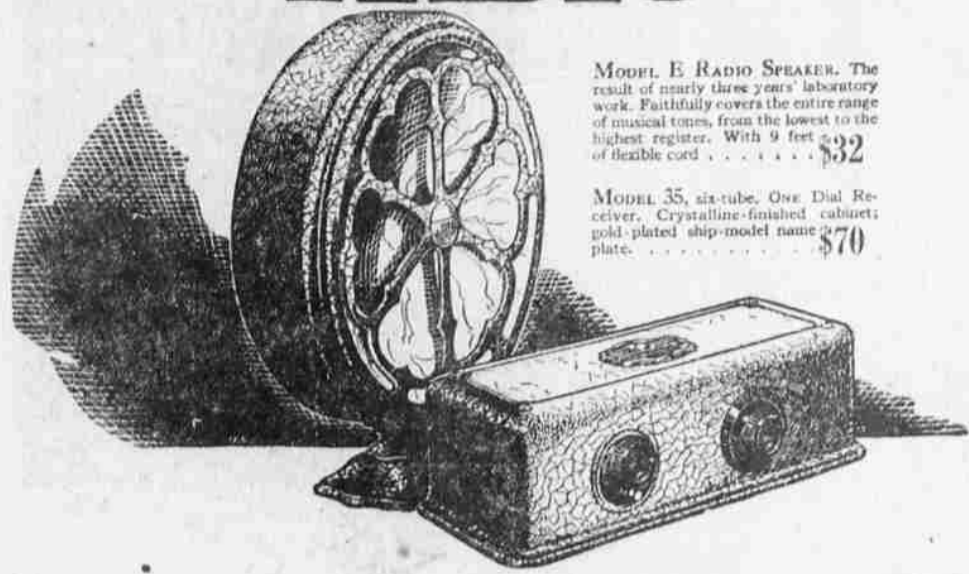

**Rain Is Delaying  
Wallowa County  
Harvesting Work**

WALLOWA, Ore., Sept. 28. (Special)—Harvesting operations have been somewhat delayed in this county again by more rain. A heavy rain in many parts of the county Friday afternoon soaked the grain both in the field and shocked enough to stop all threshing for two days. The rain was accompanied by a severe electric storm, and also by hail in parts of the county. Some damage is reported from grain being beaten down by the hail and heavy drenching of rain, which assumed near floodlike proportions at some points.

A week or ten days fair weather would see the greater part of the grain in the dry farming areas taken care of, although at least three weeks or a month will be required if all crops on irrigated farms are harvested. Many farmers in the valley were busy last week getting up a part of their seed and settings of alfalfa hay. Much of the hay which was down at the time of the heavy rains of two weeks ago, has been badly damaged. Fall seeding conditions have been improved by the large amount of moisture and a large part of the seeding has been finished, with the early seeded fields showing up green.

If a heavy milking cow does not get sufficient calcium (lime) in her food she will take it from the reserve supply in her bones to put it into the milk. This drain on the cow's body has a serious effect on her health and ultimately reduces her capacity for milk production and the bearing forth of normal, well-developed offspring. Administration of three grain vials containing a compound of ground rock phosphate, ground limestone and bone meal has been found to be much lower than that from either alfalfa or timothy hay.

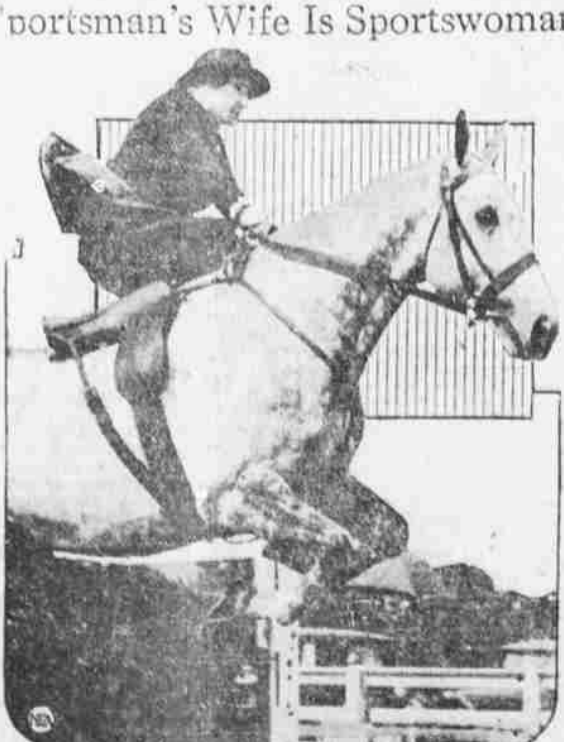
