PORTLAND MAN MISSING

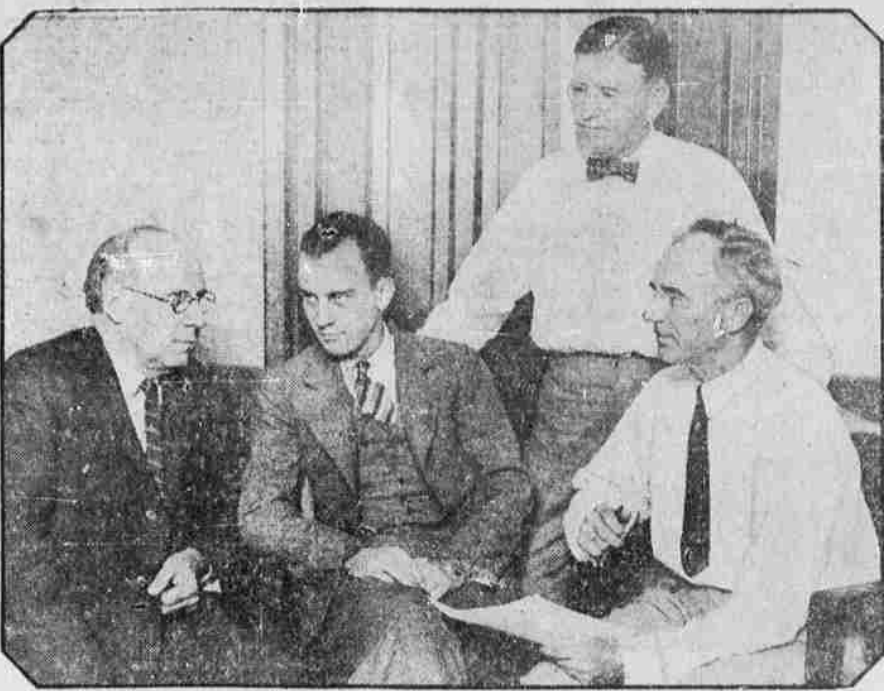

SISTER BRIDES



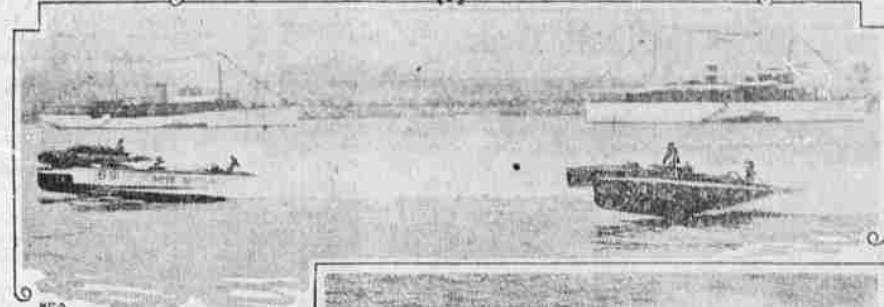

EASTERN RELIEF GROUP ARRESTED

Constantinople Reports 28 Relief Workers Imprisoned by Soviet.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 28, (AP)—Twenty-eight employees of the American Near East Relief in Russian Armenia, have been arrested by the Soviet authorities and advised to remain at the office of the organization here today. A majority of those imprisoned were teachers in American orphanages and schools, the advisers said. No reason for the arrests was given by the Soviet authorities except that they were acting under orders from Moscow. It is reported here that the Soviet authorities suspected the near eastern relief employees of violating the governmental decree which prohibits the religious teaching of children. The Soviet action was declared in American circles to be a flagrant violation of the provisions of the mandate under which the near eastern relief is working in Soviet Russia and the American officers of the relief are preparing a protest in order to obtain the release of their personnel.

NEW YORK, Sept. 28, (AP)—Twenty-eight officers of Armenian relief in the American Near East Relief in Russian Armenia, have been arrested by the Soviet authorities and advised to remain at the office of the organization here today. Police In New Jersey Seeking Willis Beach In Lillendahl Case

HAMMONTON, N. J., Sept. 28 (AP)—Reported to have left the Hammonton beach, police here today are seeking Willis Beach, a man who was sought today on a warrant, had caused hard feelings and anger among his neighbors and others, causing him to be sought by police in the murder of Dr. A. William Lillendahl, slain near here Sept. 15.

Edison Hedges, of Atlantic City, counsel for the South Vineland poultry raiser, said he would not give him up to the police but that he would produce him before a court of proper jurisdiction or the grand jury.
