Frozen Caramel Junket

One cup granulated sugar, 1-2 cup boiling water, 2 cups milk, 1 cup whipping cream, 2 tablespoons vanilla, 1 junket tablet, few grains salt.

Melt sugar in an iron frying pan, stirring constantly until the color of caramel syrup. Add boiling water and cook until thick and syrupy. Let cool and add to milk which has been heated until lukewarm. Stir in junket tablet crushed and dissolved in 2 table-spoons cold water. Add vanilla and salt and let stand in a warm place until set.
