Similar experiments have been made in other parts of the state this year, near Medford, Seaside and Pendleton. An experiment in resurfacing pavement in order to get a non-skid effect, was also made on a section of the Pendleton-Walla Walla highway and near Anorra, however it will require time to tell the outcome of the experiments.

Western Ports Are Relieved of Burden

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 29 (AP)—United States Senator Charles L. McNary, who arrived here last night, said that hereafter, western ports will be relieved of the burden of having to match the government dollar for dollar in improvement of their harbors and channels.

Senator McNary said that the \$500,000 which had been insisted upon in connection with improvements in the west had been burdensome to ports of Oregon, including Portland, Astoria, Coos Bay, Tillamook, Nehalem, Yaquina, Florence, Haddon, Umpqua and Gold Beach, which had heavily bonded themselves in order to get federal appropriations. He declared that improvements had been made in eastern and southern harbors from the very beginning without such local cooperation and that he had been steadily working to get congress to accord the same treatment to the west.

Brock and Schlee In San Francisco

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 29 (AP)—William S. Brock and Edward F. Schlee, American aviators who abandoned their round the world flight after going from Newfoundland to Kurung, thence to Japan, declared on their arrival here today that they "sure will" try to make the trip again. They brought with them from Yokohama aboard the liner Korea Maru their plane "Pride of Detroit."

The plane was unloaded to a barge before the dock was reached and rushed to Crissy field where the rudder was to be attached, adjustments made and plans discussed.

RICKARD AND FIGHTERS SAFE

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29 (AP)—While prosecutions for interstate transportation of Tunney-Benney fight films are being left to federal district attorneys, doubt was expressed today by department of justice officials that it would be possible to convict either the two fighters or Tex Rickard, promoter of the Chicago bout, in this connection.

There would only be a case against them, it was declared, in the event it appeared they were part of a conspiracy to send motion pictures of the actual fight across the state lines.

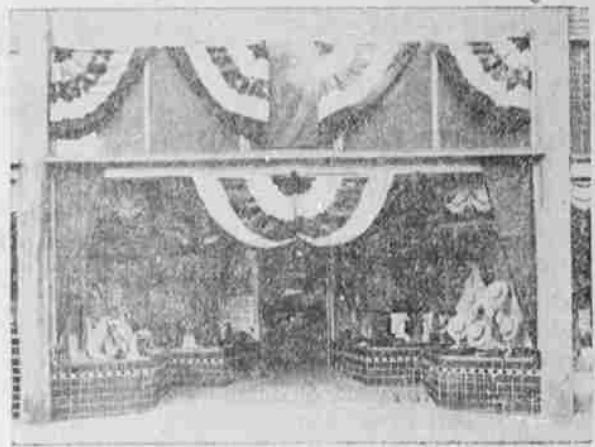

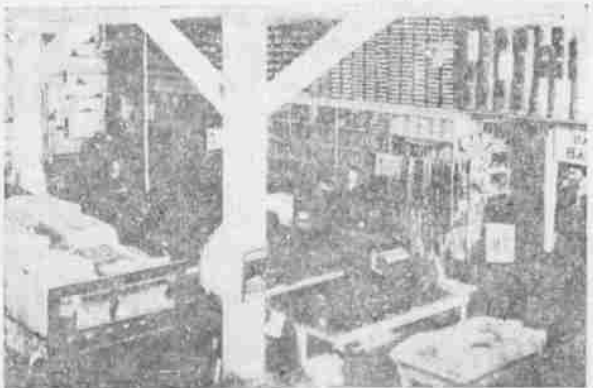
