MENUS

BREAKFAST—Orange fruit, cereal, cream, spinach with poached eggs on toast, extra toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Sautéed, egg, large chicken, grape butter, wheat muffins, lemonade.

DINNER—Meat pie, tea-minute cabbage, celery and apple salad, squash, tomatoes, milk, coffee.

Lima beans and sweet corn cut from the ribs are combined to make the luncheon dish. Milk and butter are added with salt and a dash of pepper to season the vegetables. "Lately," Always use all the butter your pocket-book will allow in seasoning vegetables for children. Good butter is rich in calcium.

Squash custards provide a hearty dinner after the rather light meal course served for dinner.

Squash Custards
Two cups washed and dried squash, 1 cup brown sugar, 4 eggs, 1 1/2 cups milk, 2 tablespoons grated orange rind, 1/2 cup raisins, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon butter, 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg.

Mix sugar, salt, spices and orange rind with sifted squash. Stir in raisins. Add yolks of eggs beaten until thick and lemon colored. Add milk, slowly stirring to blend thoroughly. Stir in melted butter. Fold in whites of eggs beaten until stiff and dry. Turn into buttered custard cups and bake in a pan of hot water in a moderate oven until firm to the touch. It will take about forty minutes to bake the custards. Serve cold.

The Garden

FALL PLANTING FOR VEGETABLES
Asparagus, cauliflower and chard are the earliest crops for fall planting to give early spring crops. In seed planting for vegetables the fall work is limited chiefly to spinach, which is now planted with as often in the fall as in the spring. Late planting is advisable so that the seed will not be started into too much growth. The seed is sown thinly in rows late in the season and the rows covered with a mulch of leaves or straw to be raked off as soon as the frost is out of the ground in spring, whereupon the spinach will start about its business at the earliest possible moment.

While spinach is always in the market it is never quite so good as when freshly sown from the home garden and cooked. Spinach is a cool-weather plant. It will spin up to seed as soon as the soil grows hot. The aim of plant breeders has been to produce a race of spinach that is not so affected to the seed habit as the old-time varieties, and Dutch experts have done very well in this line, giving us new heavy-leaved sorts not so fast to spin up to seed production. When the seedling starts its upward career the value of spinach is over and it might as well be pulled.

Plant some of the newer sorts to get the full benefit of the crop. Leaf lettuce seed is another vegetable that may be sown late in the fall as the earliest crop. This will start into growth as soon as growing conditions permit in the spring and give early lettuce to keep their give early lettuce to keep weeds down and the lettuce will have a start on the weeds.

Multipier onions may be set out this fall to give the earliest young onion crop. They are hardy perennials and, once established, are a permanent garden fixture, provided only enough bulbs are left to reproduce. This onion never makes one large bulb, but is continually dividing into small bulbs, which gives it the name of multipier. It is also known as the "polite" onion.

Onions may be set out this fall and given a much and will give their grassy foliage so excellent for a mild onion seasoning in salads and many other dishes.

A few hills of rhubarb, four good healthy ones, are sufficient to supply the average family. Rhubarb roots should be set out this fall, given plenty of fertilizer and a mulch to keep them in the ground.
