OREGON TO PLAY PACIFIC U TODAY

University Eleven Is Fast
Taking Shape, Coach J.
J. McEwan Reports

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 1 (AP)—Final preparation of the University of Oregon football team for its second game of the season on Saturday field today against Pacific University was completed last night by Captain John J. McEwan, head Webfoot coach.

In an effort to make sure that the Oregonians would put up a much better game than a week ago, and also to stage a comeback over the jinx the Pacific eleven has over the Webfoots, Coach McEwan sent his charges through a light but snappy mental drill and out them around the field on the dead run before sending them in to the dressing room. The Webfoots were not put through a stiff scrum drill but allowed only to warm up and go through the plays to be used today.

Oregon is far from a mechanical eleven that walks through its plays with precision, but it is fast taking shape. The Webfoot did today will give McEwan a chance to really size up his men and place them, according to ability displayed under fire. As yet he has not chosen a first team but after today some candidates of a regular eleven will be forthcoming. As the Webfoots meet the University of Idaho team here next week, the mentor will have to work fast.

The game today will start at 2:30 o'clock, according to announcement of Jack W. Bonfield, graduate manager.

FOREST FIRES IN STATE NEAR 1650

Unusual Season—Lightning Fires Above, Man-Made Below Average

A total of 1194 forest fires caused by lightning with 415 man-caused fires for the season up to Sept. 26, is shown in the fire summary just released by the U. S. forest service offices at Portland, Ore.

In spite of heavy rains so far in September, 48 fires were reported by the forest rangers from Sept. 19 to 26, compared to the average for the past four years (1923-1926) in the North Pacific district (including Washington's and Oregon's 22 national forests), the lightning fires for 1927 are 290 above the average and man-caused fires are 250 below. Only one forest, the Simlaw, along the Oregon coast, had no lightning fires, while the Wapinitia in Washington reported 156, and the Columbia forest 102.

The hardest hit area in the northwest was a portion of the Columbia forest, in Southern Washington, where a series of four severe lightning storms passed over a large area burned over in the bad fire year of 1902. This area is a forest of snags or standing dead trees, with however a fine stand of young forest beneath, forest rangers say. Lightning fires in that region were comparatively unknown until 1927, local old timers say. Forest service officials regard as particularly unfortunate the loss of some 20,000 acres of this young forest.

Fire Causes

Federal foresters classify fire causes under two main heads, lightning and man-caused. Of the 415 man-made fires, campfires (154) and 154, careless smokers (142), while with much smaller totals are railroads (36), brush burning (25), lumbering (17), incendiary (9), and miscellaneous (24). Under miscellaneous is included a very unusual fire on the Unalakleet forest caused by a meteorite hitting a tree, demolishing it and setting it afire. Of the 418 man-caused fires convictions have already been secured in 120 cases, with others to follow.

While some large acreages were burned, the foresters are pleased over the fact that out of the 1922 fires reported, so far 1182 did not exceed one-quarter of an acre in area; 284 did not burn over 10 acres each, while 55 covered over 10 acres each.

No Figures on Loss

A total of 35,579 acres of national forest and private forest and private forest lands inside the national forests was burned over. No figures are available as yet on

Still Searching For Golden Eagle

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1 (AP)—The sending of a naval vessel to Johnson Island, 750 miles northwest of the Hawaiian Islands to renew the search for the Golden Eagle, one of the planes lost in the Dale San Francisco-to-Honolulu air derby, was authorized today by President Coolidge. A sailing log probably will be used.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 1 (AP)—George Hearst, publisher of the San Francisco Examiner, who entered the amazing monoplane, Golden Eagle, in the Dale flight, declared here today that his father, William Randolph Hearst, requested permission of President Coolidge to use a naval vessel to continue the search in the vicinity of Johnson Island.

The damage or loss, as the detailed examinations and final reports on the larger fire are not available until later in the year.

The season was unusual in many respects, forest officers say. The unusual number of severe and "dry" lightning storms concentrated on a comparatively few national forests, decreases in the total of man-caused fires, large and extremely difficult snag fires on one forest, and a meteorite-caused fire are some of the high lights of the season to date.

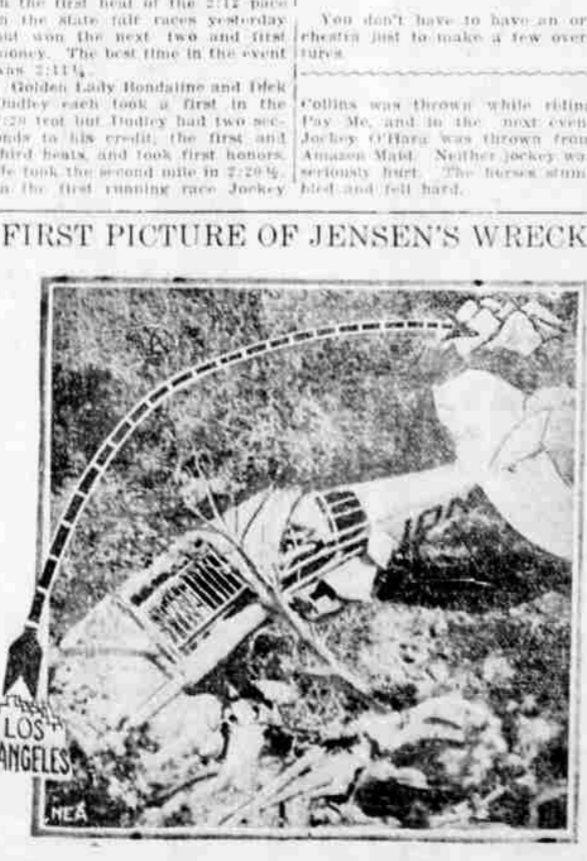
