MENUS

BREAKFAST — Fresh pears, uncooked cereal, creamed bacon on toast, baked potato puffs, extra toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON — Boiled rice with poached eggs and cheese sauce, steamed spinach, raisin graham bread, lemonade.

DINNER — Steamed haddock, shoestring potatoes, green beans in cream, tomato-cucumber-pepper salad, sweet potato trifle, milk, coffee.

Carefully boiled rice is arranged on a deep hot platter. Little hollows are made into which poached eggs are slipped. Rich cheese sauce is poured over the whole. Sprigs of parsley and occasional dashes of paprika are used to garnish the dish.

Sweet Potato Trifle
Choose smooth sweet potatoes

of uniform size—so far as possible. Pare and cut in slices about one-half inch thick. Drop in boiling water and slightly salted boiling water and boil ten minutes. Drain and let cool. For two cups of 2 cups sugar and 3/4 cup boiling water. When sugar is dissolved add potatoes and simmer gently until the syrup is thick and the potatoes are clear. Remove from fire and when cool add 1/2 teaspoon pistachio flavoring and 1 teaspoon vanilla. Serve cold with whipped cream slightly sweetened and flavored with vanilla.

The garden is a trumpet or an incomparable, the next class to the trumpet in size of its central cup. Of the commoner kinds, every garden should have the brilliant yellow Golden Spur, the softer two-toned yellow trumpet of Empress or Victoria. Posticus ornatus, the phloxian's eye or post's narcissus is indispensable and there are many improved kinds, such as King Edward VII, Horace and others and the latest of all the old posticus recurvus.

Of the finer kinds available, King Alfred, Van Waveren's Giant, Wearable Perfection and Olympia give a fine variety. In the star class for a fine yellow, Homespun is one of the best. Gloria Mundi is yellow with a fine red cup. Lucifer, white with orange-stained eye is also a fine narcissus and a good grower. The light-yellow Barri conspicuous will grow anywhere. Give daffodils a good deep soil with plenty of humus. They thrive in this but do not like hot dry situations.

Worsted! thread or yarn is so called because it was first made early in the 15th century, in Worstead, Norfolkshire, England. The name of the town was at that time spelled Worsted.

The daffodil is the first flower of spring with sufficient stem for cutting and it is one of the most valuable materials for this purpose, so much so that millions of bulbs were planted annually for cut flowers before the prohibition on importation. Added to its value for cutting, a number of the narcissus family, commonly known as daffodils, have a delightful spicy fragrance. The earliest of the daffodils are the highest ones, in varying shades from creamy white as in Mme. De Graaf to the rich golden yellow of Golden Spur, earliest of all, and King Alfred.

Then come the great races of incomparables or star saucers often edged with red, and the Leodis or pale daffodils, all white or creamy in tone. There have been so many crosses and improvements made by hybridizer that the classes are well merged one into another and sometimes it is difficult to tell whether
