"What Price Glory" the merry war film now at the Arcade theater, is a screen play without a villain. Another novel feature of it is that you can use your own discretion in picking the hero. Nobody will dispute that the fiery Charlemagne, played by Dolores Del Rio, is a more than adequate heroine, and that Privates Kiper and Lipinsky supply all the comedy necessary.

But who's the hero? Is it Captain Plagg, the hard-boiled Marine who uses profanity by preference, gets gloriously drunk at Bar-Loue, and leads his men into battle as light-heartedly as though he were going on a picnic?
