WORLD SERIES TO BEGIN TOMORROW

Weather Man Predicts Opener Will Be Fair—Both Teams Confident

(Associated Press Sports Writer) PITTSBURGH, Oct. 4. (AP)—Pirates and Yankees camped today on the outskirts of the battle field and waited for a ray of sun to do its duty in drying out Forbes field for the first game of the world's series tomorrow.

Rain yesterday brought rest to the players, needed by the Pirates but not by the Yankees, anxious to put the finishing touches on their preparations. The rain came when the Yankees had had only a few minutes' batting practice and kept the Pirates off the field altogether.

However, the downpour brought no rest to the carpenters building temporary seats which have already been sold. The craftsmen wrestled with slippery hammers and saws as they built benches to seat 4000 more than the big playing field normally offers hospitality.

The sound of the hammers beat time to a cry from the fans for tickets, and more tickets. But there were no tickets except in the hands of speculators who, think they are worth much more than their price tag would indicate. The scalpers hope the sentimental value of the pasteboards will be realized before game time.

With a day to pass before the first act of the annual classic can be staged, Pittsburgh was practically in the hands of the experts. Old inhabitants said the strong hold of the hold. It was never before been subject to such intensified experting.

Each For Himself

Most of the information came straight from the feed box, many of the players using the hands that will later wield bats and toss curving balls to pound writers in giving the fans the "low down." This information has been valuable thus far. Every Yankee writer has predicted victory for the American league while the count was evened by the Pirate series, who to a man pick the National league entry.

The fans, who seem to know a good deal about the situation, weighing the credits and debits of the contending clubs with careful thought, arriving at the conclusion that this is the question mark at the end of the world series sentence.

"Can the pitching of the Pirates still the mighty bats of the Yankees?" Leading the flying wedge of the Yankees, Babe Ruth and Lou Gehrig who hit 197 home runs between them, were the objects of sharp scrutiny by Pirate pitchers. The Corsairs' deep thinkers made no secret of the fact that the big fellows will not get good balls to hit.

Waner Twists In Spot

The Pirates' batting ace, Paul Waner and his brother, Lloyd, make up in speed what they lack in weight and the home folk were confident that the Oklahoma "twins" would be able to hold their own with Ruth and Gehrig in spite of giving away a hundred pounds in tonnage.

The rival managers were expected to put their best pitching beta forward. Walter Hottel for New York and Ray Kremer for Pittsburgh. Both are right handers and neither needs any introduction to the world's series.

Wiley Moore is slated to share the main Yankee pitching assignments with Hoyt. Moore has an understanding ball called a "sinker" which seems to change its mind between mound and plate. Manager Hottel points out that he also has Vic Aldridge, who has reputation for never throwing a fast ball while he has a curve left.

Fair Weather Predicted

In spite of the all-day drizzle, Monday, breaking at times into a regular rain, the weather man sticks to his story that Wednesday and Thursday will be fair. If he is right, the series will be started tomorrow and continue through the next day, the scene being shifted to New York for games Friday, Saturday and Sunday and returning here Monday if there is any excuse to keep delaying. A seventh game, if necessary will end the test where it begins at Pittsburgh.

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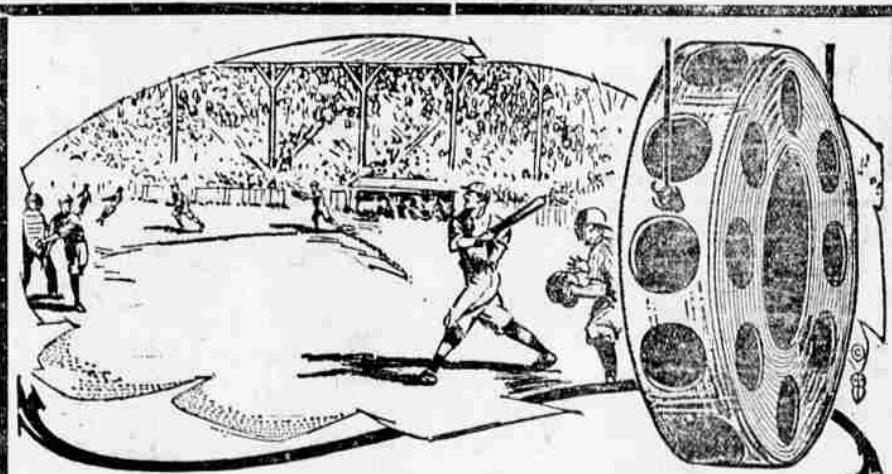
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
