LUNCHEON—Chicken soufflé, creamed celery, graham rolls, baked pears with chocolate sauce, milk, tea.
DINNER—Roast loin of lamb, fried potatoes, grilled tomatoes, macaroni of vegetable salad, peach parafah, milk, coffee.
