Plot and counterplot run riot in "The Heart of the Yukon," which plays for the last time today at the Colonial theater. But in spite of the many foreshadowings which flash in this fine drama of the Alaska of gold rush days, there is no point in the story where the plot is obscured by too much interplay of dramatic incidents. Throughout the picture, the story is told in a vivid, lively and straightforward manner which adds to the interest.

In brief, the theme concerns the adventures of a girl who goes out to seek her father whom she has never seen. Her search takes her to Alaska where gold has just been found, and into the country have come all sorts of adventurers, from the pioneers themselves to the parasites whose living is made on the weaknesses of others.

She falls into the net of one "Cash" Gynon, a saloon keeper and from then on events move swiftly to a climax which is breath-taking in its dramatic intensity.

"Charming Anne Cornwall plays the part of the girl, while John Bowers is seen in the other leading roles. Russell Simpson, Frank Campan and Eddie Hearn complete the list of principals. W. S. Van Dyke was the director.

"Back to God's Country" Stars Renee Adoree

A picture as impressive as the vast uncharted snow regions of the North will be shown at the Star theater Thursday and Friday.

It is "Back to God's Country," a dynamic tale of the North, from James Oliver Curwood's ever-popular novel of the same name, and has been made into a really spectacular production by Irvin Willat who directed for Universal.

"Glory" To Show At Arcade Today, Thursday

For two years we have waited for the William Fox film version of "What Price Glory"—and it was worth waiting for. This magnificent dramatic comedy of the war is now at the Arcade theater where it will be shown again today and Thursday.

With the limitations of the stage play cast aside, with Raoul Walsh setting his camera to visualize the hates, passions and loves of the war, there is a necessity that we place this screen entertainment at the top of the list of best motion pictures of the year.

None of the vitality of the original stage production was lost in the screen translation. In fact, we have to agree with all the other critics in the opinion that here is a picture that surpasses the original in every way. The picture stands first in the same reel, composed, tensely dramatic fashion which made the stage presentation such a highly successful entertainment.

The film truly adheres to the stage pattern in all its essential details and improves upon it in its scope of the war scenes. Its atmosphere, its ever increasing interest, its thrills and its hilarious laughter.

"What Price Glory" is marked by one of the greatest performances ever flashed upon the screen, that of Victor McLaglen, the hard-boiled Captain of the Marines, who gives a portrayal which is astounding. In fact, you cannot imagine anyone else in this marvelous role after seeing McLaglen's performance. Edmund Lowe, as the shifty Sergeant Quirt, also gives a striking portrayal of a most difficult part, and Dolores Del Rio, as the charming, seductive Charmaine, could not, in our opinion, have given a stronger impersonation.

The comedy sequences in this remarkable drama contain more laughs than any picture of the past five years, and due credit should be given the performance of Ted McNamara and Sammy Cohen for their contributions to the funny side of this magnificent cinema entertainment.

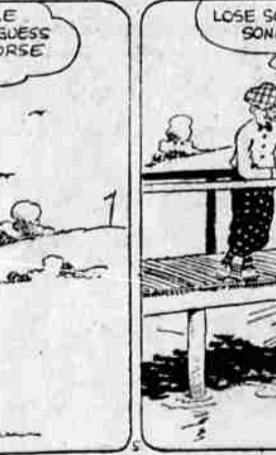
