

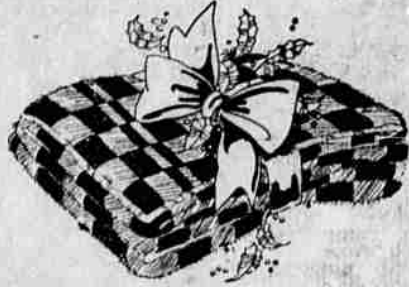

WHAT THE WORD GOTITRE MEANS

Member Gorgias Memorial To seek out and catalogue all definitions of what the word gotitre means would be an interesting and lengthy task. Casting aside speculation, however, let us seek out the real meaning of this word by the simple process of finding first where the word came from and then seeing how the original meaning is applied to a definite abnormality or disease.

Gotitre is obviously not an English word, although it is often and quite correctly spelled gutter. Like many other words, it has been taken from another language, in this case French, and adopted into our own vocabulary. Turning to a French dictionary, we find that gotitre is not even French, but a modification of an old Latin word, gutta. And we are surprised to find that gutta simply means throat. But if that is all it means, how has it come to describe a definite medical abnormality?

Centuries ago the French probably recognized that lumps of various sizes appeared in the front of some people's necks. Needing a good descriptive word for this, they took the old Latin word gutta and made from it a French adjective, guttoreux. Not knowing what such spellings were, it was quite natural that they should think of such people as being throaty. For many years physicians and laymen alike were content to call people with enlarged necks guttoreux, or throaty, and let it go at that. But as medical and anatomical knowledge increased, it was found that such big necks were due to an enlargement of a single organ, the thyroid gland. This gland is roughly "T" shaped, and lies on each side and in front of the windpipe. Normally, it can just be felt. If any part of this gland enlarges, this enlargement can be felt and often seen.

All but gotitre means then is an enlargement of the thyroid gland. Its existence in so many hundreds of people constitutes a serious problem of individual and public health. No physical examination can be called complete that does not include a careful search for any enlargement of the thyroid gland and an equally careful appraisal checked by laboratory methods if necessary, to see whether it is functioning in a normal or a diseased manner. Timber Losses Are Avoided By Eradication of Beetles and Grubs

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Forty-five million dollars a year could be saved in timber in the United States by correct methods in fighting grubs and wood-boring beetles, entomologists say.

The direct money loss to lumber and cut timber, resulting from defects caused by insects, is enormous. It is greater, authorities declare, than the loss of live trees. In lumber, the defects not only make large supplies unfit for use, but reduce all affected material to lower grades.

Thomas E. Snyder, forest insect investigations, places the principal types of insect attacks in three definite groups, pinholes, grubs, holes, and powder post. The first appear as round, usually open, holes ranging from one one-hundredth to one-fourth of an inch in diameter, made either by ambrosia beetles or timber worms. Pinholes made by the beetles are of two types, those caused by adult boring into the trunks of growing trees to lay eggs and rear young, or by larvae which also may burrow into the wood, and those caused by adult beetles or larvae in freshly felled logs or bolts, and in green or partly seasoned timber.

Grub holes, or the larger worm holes, are oval, circular, or irregular holes three-eighths of an inch to one inch in diameter, produced by adult insects boring into or laying eggs in the trunks of living trees or boring into green logs to lay eggs and rear young. The young, or larvae, cause most of the damage to the wood, which serves both as food and shelter. Powder post is that class of defect in which the larvae or insects reduce the wood fibres of seasoned, or partly seasoned, wood to a powderlike condition. The damage occurs in the seasoned or partly seasoned sapwood or heartwood of both hardwood and softwoods.
