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Invite Oregon's School Teachers To Conference

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Oct. 7. (Special)—All school principals and teachers of La Grande and the state at large will be invited to attend the conference on diagnostic testing, to be held in Portland at the public library Friday and Saturday, October 14 and 15. It is announced by the school of education of the University of Oregon, which will have charge of the session.

The specific subject of the conference will be testing methods now in use in the schools of Portland and of the state, and this will be supplemented by data from observations on schools in other parts of the country.

"Testing in Oregon Schools" will be the topic of J. D. McLaughlin, of Corvallis, and around his report will center much of this discussion. W. A. Dixon, principal, of Portland, will deliver a talk on "An Experiment in the Use of Tests in Teaching Reading," and Superintendent C. A. Rice of Portland will talk on "Diagnostic Testing and Remedial Teaching in Arithmetic."

Two features of the meet will be the lectures by Worth McClure, of Seattle, noted expert on diagnostic testing, and the explanation of the educational service bureau of the University of Oregon, by C. L. Haffaker, of the school of education.

General discussions on the various phases of the testing subjects will be held each day, and all educators are urged to take part in the meet.

Mr. Arnold Bennett, Hall, president of the University of Oregon, will preside at the first day session, while C. A. Howard, state superintendent of schools, will preside October 15.

This will be the first step in the furthering of the work of the educational research bureau of the University of Oregon, the work of which will be fully explained at this time.
