UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Oct. 7. (Special)—The serious business of preparing for an opening Pacific Coast Conference football game is underway in earnest in the University of Oregon gridiron camp as Captain John J. McElwan, head coach, is driving his proteges hard. Oregon swings into its conference schedule here Saturday against the University of Idaho. This will be the first meeting of these two teams since 1925 when the Vandals defeated the Ducks 14-0.
