New Western Star Coming to Local Theater

Something new in western pictures will be presented by PEO Saturday with the introduction of a new star, Bob Steele, in "The Movie Kid" at the Star theater.

Jewel-bedeked and flirtatious dowagers known as "matinee ladies" seek-hated, snail youths gigolos, ornate cafes resplendent in an artificial warmth of jazz and strident gaiety.

Into this jazz atmosphere of metropolitan sophistication is woven the plot of Warner Bros' production of "Matinee Ladies" in which May McAvoy and Malcolm MacGregor play leading roles playing at Colonial for last time today.

Weaving its way through carefree comedy and exciting drama, this lively love story is centered in an atmosphere laden with the heedlessness and abandon of a circle made up of idling, thrill-seeking women who openly court afternoon pleasure in questionable flirtations with young men of frail fibre.

Hedda Hopper plays a principal role as a playfully amorous "matinee lady." Richard Tucker is seen as a wealthy idler whose romantic conquests hint of villainy. The story unfolded is startling in theme and has a sparkle of mingling comedy and melodrama.

Lon Chaney Performs Feats in New Film

Arrived—a new entry among the world's "famous feet" has been the feet of Lon Chaney.

They have taken their place beside the celebrated extremities of Ann Pennington, Gertrude Hoffman, Anna Pavlova and even the justly famous Feet of Clay!

Most feet achieve fame when attached to noted dancers — but Chaney's achieved note in a more strenuous manner. In his new Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer starring vehicle, "The Unknown," playing at the Arcade theater today and Saturday, he performs a series of tricks with his educated feet that are astounding. In the role of an armless sideshow freak, he throws knives, fires a rifle, eats, drinks, and even shaves himself with them!

It is said that he practiced for the role three months; but it seems unbelievable that in this short time he could do all the strange tricks he performs with the aid of ten toes. He is as expert as any "armless wonder" of the stage.

John George as the chief clown and Nick de Ruiz as the circus owner are also adequately cast in the big production. Hundreds of people take part in spectacular circus scenes and Kerry figures in a remarkable scene when his strength is pitted against galloping horses.

Cutworms, grasshoppers, and root maggots are destroyed by winter plowing and burning of the fence rows and ditch banks. San Jose scale, tent caterpillars, tree crickets, aphids, leaf hoppers, and cicadas are destroyed by burning the prunings from the orchard, and the lush and cane fruits.
