Local tomatoes are apparently nearly done in the market. Low quality lots were moving at 50 to 75c while a choice lot from New Bridge, Ore., found little buyer interest at \$1.25 per box.

The market was oversupplied with California grapes of all seasonable kinds, and prices were below cost on much of the stock.

3 Escape From Insane Asylum; One Is Violent

SALISBURY, Oct. 7 (AP)—Officers throughout the Willamette valley were on the lookout early today for three fugitives who escaped last night from the state hospital for the insane, one of them a dangerous man, from the violent ward of the institution. The dangerous member of the escaped trio is Lester Ives, 36 years old, violent and unobedient in demeanor, especially when crossed in any way. He is described as 5 feet 11 inches tall, heavy set and with head almost entirely bald. He was committed from Multnomah county.

Harold L. Porter, another one of the escapes, is said to be of suicidal tendency. He is not considered a menace to other persons. He was committed from Jackson county.

Charles Merrill, 20, the third member is also from Multnomah county. He is not considered dangerous.

The three men are believed to have made their escape by passing under a radiator that was being repaired.

POLICE TODAY SEEKING HIT, RUN MOTORIST

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 7 (AP)—Police today were seeking a hit-and-run motorist who last night knocked down and critically injured Mrs. Elizabeth Prudler and Mrs. Elsie Grotter, and then, after stopping his car, deliberately drove over their prostrate forms and sped away.

The accident, which occurred at a downtown intersection, was witnessed by a passing motorist, R. F. McKay, who gave chase but was unable to overtake the other car.

Remus Pleads Not Guilty of Murder

CINCINNATI, Oct. 7 (AP)—George Remus, once millionaire motelsman, who shot his wife, Imogene, fatally, on her porch before her divorce hearing yesterday morning, pleaded "not guilty" when arraigned for preliminary hearing today. Remus was held to the grand jury without bond.

Remus awaited court action, he said, "with a clear conscience," adding that he "owed it to society" to kill his wife.

Schools in Grants Pass Still Closed

GRANTS PASS, Ore., Oct. 7 (AP)—Extension of the closing of city schools here has been decided upon following the first death from the influenza epidemic in this city. It is probable that the city council will also extend the quarantine on all children until all danger has been removed. Mayor George Fox has asked that all public meetings be suspended. No new cases have been reported today.

The condemned man, calmly surveying the scene, saw the correspondents of the Associated Press, the New York Times and the New York Herald Tribune, the only foreign newspapermen present, waved his hand and cried in English: "Goodbye! Goodbye!" Then as the firing squad took its position he said to the soldiers: "You are too far away, come closer."

Quiano advanced a few steps. "You are still too far away," said Quiano, with not a tremor in his voice. "You had better come still closer."

DE LA HUERTA DEAD
NOGALES, Sonora, Oct. 7 (AP)—The bullet-riddled body of Alfonso De La Huerta, brother of Adolfo de la Huerta, former provisional president of Mexico, was brought into this border city at 5 a. m. this morning.

The body was brought in on a flat car by General Manuel Aguirre, brother of General Jesus Aguirre, both of the Mexican federal army, who was sent with 100 men to hunt for de la Huerta yesterday when the latter was sent at Huamantla, 60 miles from here.

General Aguirre reported that he came upon de la Huerta and nine companions, one of whom was General Baron Medina, several miles east of Huamantla.

De la Huerta and his officer companion gave battle and were literally riddled with bullets. The eight Indians fled at the approach of the federals.

De la Huerta's body, wrapped in an oily tarpaulin with the head uncovered and repositioning, was taken to the plaza here, where it was left exposed to the view of the populace.

NOGALES, Ariz., Oct. 7 (AP)—Official dispatches received at Nogales Sonora from the war department Mexico City, announced today the execution by firing squads at Zacatecas, state of Zacatecas, of General Alfredo Rodriguez chief of the federals considerably outnumbered Norberto Alvera, both charged with mutiny.

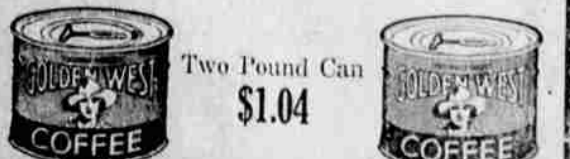
