SUN PERMITS
HARVEST TO
BEGIN AGAINNorth Powder Farmers
Already Operating
ThrashersNO FROST DAMAGE
OF SIZE REPORTEDStandard of Grain Out
During Rainy Season
Decreases But Not in
Large Amount

Farmers of the county generally are rejoicing over the fact of a few nights ago, which caused the weather to clear up and the rain to stop, but was not severe enough to do much damage to the potatoes or other crops.

In the North Powder section, where there was less rain, two thrashing machines resumed work today. R. C. Wheeler, of Union, plans to start his thrashing machine again Monday he said today. He reports that the grain in that section of the county is not damaged as badly as some of the earlier reports indicated.

Weight Reduced

While all of the grain will be bleached and the weight per bushel will be less because of the rain it is good year in Union county as far as crops are concerned, and the unusually large crop will make up for the amount which the grain will be docked because of its quality, many believe.

Where the grain was next to the ground the rain caused it to sprout, which was the most serious damage to the crop. What percent of the grain was hurt by the rain will not be known until the harvest has been completed.

Wheat Hurt Most

Wheat was damaged the most of the grain crops, although oats and barley was also hurt.

Potato growers were also glad to see the frost, which killed the tops of the potatoes, and after about ten days, allowed for the tubers to harden and the ground to dry out, digging will begin.

The rainfall during the month of September was nearly three times that of the average year, the average being less than two inches.

County Library
Is Supported by
Local TeachersEducators Go on Record
as Favoring Modern
Methods, Completion of
Normal School.

Five resolutions, including a recommendation of the completion of the Eastern Oregon Normal school and one favoring the reestablishment of the county library by special tax were passed yesterday at the closing session of the annual Union county teachers' institute held at the La Grande high school Thursday and Friday.

W. V. Connor, president of the county unit of the Oregon State Teachers' association, was in charge of the business meeting. Addresses by Dr. J. R. Jewell, dean of vocational education at O. A. C. who spoke on "The Ideal Teacher," C. Seymour, Oregon club leader, Miss Mahout Doty, local librarian and Thomas H. Gentie, training department at Monmouth, were heard during the afternoon. The institute was officially adjourned at about 4 o'clock.

Other Resolutions

Other resolutions were passed favoring the adoption of some plan of teachers' tenure and greater recognition and wider use of modern methods of educational measurements in schools of the county and in state examinations and favoring the N. E. A. code of professional ethics for teachers. Resolutions of thanks were extended to W. W. Nussbaum and the club for musical furnished to the Associated Girl students for floral offerings to E. A. Sayre, county school superintendent, for the splendid program offered and to C. A. Howard, state superintendent, and other institute instructors for their helpful messages.

CLUBS' WORK
PRAISED BY
H. C. SEYMOURState Leader Says Union
County Exhibits Among
the Best in OregonBOYS AND GIRLS
EFFORTS VALUEDE. A. Sayre and H. G.
Avery Favorably Men-
tioned for Their In-
struction, Cooperation

Union county is one of the best in the state in reference to boys and girls club work, according to H. C. Seymour, state club leader, who left last night for Corvallis, after taking part in the annual Union county teachers' institute program here.

The club boys and girls here are doing a creditable work, which compares favorably with the best of the counties, where full time club leaders are employed, Mr. Seymour said. E. A. Sayre, county school superintendent here, and H. G. Avery, county agriculturist, who devote much of their time to club work in the county, are largely responsible for the outstanding club work here, Mr. Seymour said.

Comments on Exhibit

The state club leader commented on Union county's club exhibit at the state fair in Salem. There were 19 club exhibits at the fair and Union county ranked among the best. The booth exhibit, which was the first from Union county, included sewing, cooking, home making, gardening, and dairy herd record work. In addition to this, the Union county club had an exhibit of home calves and sheep in the barns, which placed well. Clifford Conrad's ton litter of Chester White hogs, receiving second prize in the open class.

Having a booth exhibit at the state fair was of much value to the county, according to Mr. Seymour, in that it was labeled Union county and was viewed by thousands of persons attending the fair, and that the exhibits showed Union county to be well balanced.

DYNAMITE BLAST
INJURES WORKERCecil Kelly Suffers Flesh
Wounds as Result of a
Premature Explosion

Cecil Kelly, employed by the county on the Catherine Creek road, was injured about the back yesterday when dynamite which the workers were blasting exploded before it was expected to and he was hit, tearing a number of holes in the flesh of his back.

He was taken to Hot Lake where the county was dressed. Today he was able to return home, although it will be a few days before he will be able to return to work.

Had any of the dynamite missiles struck him in the head, his injuries undoubtedly would have been much more serious.

TWO BALKAN
STATES NEAR
OPEN BREAKJugo Slavia and Bulgaria
at Highest Point of Tension Since 1912IRREGULAR BANDS
STIR UP FEELINGLondon Hears That Bul-
garia Expresses Regret
over Murder and Fron-
tier Raids.

BELGRADE, Jugo Slavia, Oct. 8. (AP)—Relations between Jugo Slavia and Bulgaria were at their highest point of tension today since the Balkan war of 1912.

The Jugo Slavia minister in Sofia was under instructions to demand abrogation of the contending (irregular) bands in Macedonia on the alternative of a diplomatic break. The border was closed, and Jugo Slavia troops were seeking to stamp out the Macedonian terrorists reported to be roaming the region seeking favorable opportunities to carry out their bombing raids.

Indians Favor an
Annual Pilgrimage

ENTERPRISE, Ore., Oct. 8.—Indians who have been visiting the county from time to time in increasing numbers of late, wish to make the pilgrimage to the home of their fathers a dignified annual event. This developed at a council held during the fair which was attended by friends among the white men.

Before he left, Ralph Armstrong, an educated Nez Perce, laid his plan before several persons, for consideration during the coming winter. The Indians, he said, would prefer to come in the middle of summer, and to camp near the cemetery at the foot of the lake. They would be pleased to take part in the pioneer reunions, and they desire that their children should become acquainted with the young generation of whites so that both should become friends and feel they shared in a common heritage in the valley.

It is a long trip from the Nez Perce country in Northern Idaho and visiting Indians are put to considerable expense. They ask that residents of this county where this expense by providing camp grounds and say for the horses of the Indians.

Mr. Armstrong suggested that the matter be submitted to the commercial clubs of Joseph and Enterprise, and an effort made to arrange for the annual visit in the interest of friendship of the past and the present dwelling in the valley.

Weather Outlook
For Week Given

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 8. (AP)—The weather outlook for the week beginning Oct. 9, was announced here today by the United States weather bureau as follows:

Far western states: The outlook is for generally fair weather in California and Nevada and for unsettled weather in Oregon, Washington and Idaho with occasional rains during the forepart of the week.

Temperatures near the seasonal average are indicated.

Western Cherry
Growers Win in
Tariff Battle

WASHINGTON, Oct. 8. (AP)—Oregon and California cherry growers are expected to have won their fight to convince the United States tariff commission that the present import duty on cherries should be increased from 2 cents to 3 cents, instead of 1 cent, under the tariff of any increase under the flexible provisions of the Fordney-McCumber tariff.

The commission will recommend to President Coolidge that the cherry duty be increased by 1 cent per pound, it has been learned on good authority. Western growers contended that lower cost of production and preparation for market entitled the domestic fruit to greater protection than is receiving under the existing schedule.

Eastern manufacturers of preserved fruit, particularly maraschino cherries, declared before the commission that it was necessary for them to import a certain type of Italian cherry to meet their domestic needs, and that the western growers were not able to supply it.
