Blanche Sweet
in "Singed"
At Arcade Sunday

Blanche Sweet, who is appearing
in the role of Dolly Wall, proprie-
tor of an oil-boom town social club

"The Crystal Cup"
Showing at
Star Sunday

A "villain" who appears only in
the first scene, but whose sinister
influence is manifest during the

"Resurrection"
Coming to
Colonial Sunday

Tolstoy's "Resurrection," the
flesh-and-blood drama of Prince
and peasant, love sacred and pro-
fane brings Rod La Roque and
Dolores del Rio to the screen of the
Colonial theater Sunday, Monday
and Tuesday in the Inspiration-
Edwin Carewe film version offer-
ed by United Artists.

The most widely read classic of
modern times, enjoyed wherever
people read books, translated from
the Russian of Leo Tolstoy into
eleven languages in the past thirty
years, "Resurrection" is of un-
usual interest to film-goers be-
cause it is drama strong and ab-
sorbing enough to have made Tol-
stoy beloved by the masses of the
world. Edwin Carewe satisfies a
seventeen-year-old ambition at last
in bringing to the screen this story,
which has fascinated him since he
played Prince Dmitri himself in a
stock company in Kansas.

Rod La Roque is the star of
"Resurrection," playing the role
of the Prince who sinned and sor-
rowed. Dolores del Rio is Kat-
usha Maslova, the peasant ward of
his two maiden aunts, the girl
whose love is defiled and sullied,
only to be won again through the
remorse of the Prince. Miss del Rio
is afforded her greatest screen op-
portunity to date and her work is
done under the direction of the
same Edwin Carewe who discover-
ed her in Mexico City in 1925.

The very human story of "Re-
surrection," the film, is identical
with that of the novel, no major li-
berties having been taken, even
with the logical ending. There is
the depiction of the Prince's
pure love for the peasant maid, the
evil companionship and the mad
carousing of the Prince at St. Pe-
tersburg, and the Prince on the
jury that tries Katusha Maslova,
the girl he himself has betrayed.
Finally, there is that grand march
to Siberia. Prince and peasant
alike laboring over the steps as
the chains of calves clank and
hoofs thud on the hard-baked

roads. The final scenes are exact
reproductions of those in Tolstoy's no-
vel. Edwin Carewe had in Holly-
wood the invaluable assistance of
Count Ilya Tolstoy, son of the au-
thor of "Resurrection," while mak-
ing the film. As a matter of fact,
the Count portrays his father in a
prologue to the film proper.

The cast includes aside from
Rod La Roque and Dolores del
Rio, Marc McDermott, Clarissa
Selwynne, Vera Lewis, Eve South-
ern and Count Ilya Tolstoy. Rita
Carewe, daughter of the director,
plays a part. The adaptation was
written by Mr. Carewe and Count
Tolstoy, the scenario by Finis Fox,
and the titles by Tom Miranda.
Inspiration Pictures, Inc., and Ed-
win Carewe jointly present the film
through United Artists.
