CONVENTION PROGRAM IS MADE PUBLIC—(Continued from Page 1)

Members of the Oregon congress will be held.

In the evening at 7:45 o'clock there will be a musical program and the opening session of the convention, which will be presided over by Mrs. Carl G. Helms, of La Grande, vice president of district No. 5. There will be greetings by the hostess city and a response by Mrs. Louis Dodge, first vice president of the congress. Mrs. W. W. Gabriel, president of the congress, will give an address after which there will be a reception for the visitors.

On Wednesday there will be conferences from 8 until 10 o'clock in the morning. At 10 o'clock the meeting will be called to order, followed by the invocation and announcements and the presentation of the convention program by Mrs. William Kietzer.

At 10:15 o'clock convention reports will be given and the first report will be that of the state officers. This will be followed by community singing and at 10:45 o'clock the health department will report and at 12:30 the credentials committee.

May Revise By-Laws—At 1:30 o'clock the afternoon session will be called to order, the minutes of the previous meeting given and the proposed revision of the by-laws read. At 1:40 o'clock the reports of the auditing committee and the budget committee will be given and at 2 o'clock the district vice presidents will report.

At 2:30 o'clock the department of work will report, a few which there will be community singing. This will be followed by the reports of the department of public welfare and the magazine committee.

At 6:30 o'clock Wednesday evening there will be a publicity dinner, of which Mrs. E. D. Towler is chairman. This will be followed by a musical program and speakers at 8 o'clock.

Elect Officers Thursday—Thursday conferences will open the day's work and will be held until 10 o'clock, when the business session will begin, action will be taken on proposed amendments and the election of officers will take place. Community singing will follow the election, after which the re-

ports of special committees will be heard.

After lunch the reports of special committees will be continued until 2 o'clock, when the department of education and the department of home service will report.

In the evening, beginning at 7:45 o'clock there will be a musical program and speakers, followed by a reception hour.

On Friday, the last day of the convention, conferences will be held during the morning, and at 10 o'clock the last session will open and the report of the resolutions committee heard. The report on conferences will also be heard at this time and any other unfinished business transacted. Immediately following the adjournment of the post-convention meeting of the board of managers will be held, which will close the business of the convention.

Mrs. L. Faus, chairman of the department of education, will be furnished by the La Grande Parent-Teacher city council during the afternoon.

Mrs. L. Faus, president of the council, is general chairman of the convention, and Mrs. C. F. McPherson, past president of the council, is assistant general chairman.

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
