

MONDAY MORNING TRADE IS SLOW

Prices in Portland Markets Little Changed Over Weekend

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 10 (AP)—Early Monday morning trade in the local wholesale market for seasonal fresh fruits and vegetables was generally slow at prices little changed from Saturday.

Grapes continue to be the product of heaviest supply and all varieties of these move slowly at prices around cost. Oregon Mission grapes were quoted at \$1.25 per box, and Oregon Tokays at \$1.75 per box, but sales were made at lower figures in instances. Supplies of local Concord are very plentiful and move slowly at around a per pound in 25-pound lugs.

Comice pears were \$1 per lug, those packed. Local tomatoes are higher since supplies have become rather limited, and quotations this morning were from 75 to 90c for good stock.

Pretty Greenhaven apples were offered at \$3 to \$3.25 per box. Satway peaches can still be had at \$1.15 for top best.

Wholesale trade in country dressed meats was at a standstill with heavy veal dragging around a top price of 20c per pound.

Choice hogs were also easy, with 14 to 15c in talking top prices. A small trade in lamb was at steady prices, 20 to 21c.

Doubly receipts were light and prices were generally steady.

Renewed Selling Pressure Brings Sharp Reaction

NEW YORK, Oct. 10 (AP)—Renewed selling pressure against wheat today brought a sharp reaction in the stock market. Notwithstanding the fact that the market was generally steady, the selling pressure was enough to bring about a sharp reaction.

Liquidation of United States Steel common was quite persistent, the stock dropping below 144 as against a high of 160 less than a month ago.

Case Threshing Machine, Aid Reduction, Union Carbide, American Water Works, Alton Power, E. S. Cast Iron Pipe, New York Central and many other recent leaders sold down 3 to 5 points.

The closing was heavy. Prices drifted lower in the late afternoon when U. S. Steel got down as low as 142 1/2 and Chesapeake and Ohio, Alton Power, Mack Truck, U. S. Cast Iron Pipe and Lucile Gas moved in to 6 1/2 points.

A violent upturn in Houston Oil, which sold at 17 1/2 against Saturday's close of 16 1/2, intimidated the short interests, however, and some declines in other stocks were made up in the final dealings. Total sales approximated 2,100,000 shares.

TWO GROUPS CLASH
ATHENS, Greece, Oct. 10 (AP)—A clash between Greek soldiers and Bulgarian combatants on Greek territory near Gornitova in which two of the irregulars were killed was reported in Athens today. Bombs were found on the bodies, the advisers stated.

The Greek government, which has had occasion in the past to complain to Bulgaria concerning comitadj activities is watching the Serbo-Bulgarian situation closely.

The Greeks consider Serbian indignation justified, especially as the Italian press is supporting Bulgaria, but recognizes the inability of the Bulgarian government to suppress the comitadj unless supported through the league of nations.

BATTLE AN HOUR LONG
PARRIS, Oct. 10 (AP)—A detachment of Greek guerrillas fought for more than an hour last night with a band of Bulgarian comitadjis near the village of Gornitova in the region of Florina, says a Hays dispatch from Salonika.

The dispatch says that the Bulgarian comitadjis finally retired across the Bulgarian frontier leaving two dead whose bodies were placed on public view in Florina.

The comitadjis were believed to have crossed into Greek territory by way of Iugo Slavia.

MAKES CHARGES
EL PASO, Tex., Oct. 10 (AP)—General G. A. Salinas former Mexican minister of aviation and now a presidential refugee in the U. S. today charged that prisoners in Mexico City are being held and people are being slain in the streets by police and soldiers in the attempt by President Calles to enforce "power by peace."

PLANS TO STOP CABARET RAIDS

Prohibition Enforcement Chief Lays Down Rules for His Agents

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10 (AP)—Spectacular raids on night clubs and cabarets will not be tolerated by Prohibition Commissioner Doran who today sent out a new manual of instructions for dry agents.

The agents were ordered to cease the practice of dramatically rushing into cabarets with drawn revolvers in making raids. Arms, the commissioner said, should be used only in self defense.

The necessary display encouraged shoot ing. Agents, however, may still use shotguns, rifles and machine guns in operating against moonshiners in the mountainous sections.

The commissioner also admonished agents against unnecessary drinking of liquors to be used as evidence. Drinking the order stipulated should be used only strictly in the line of duty.

Federal prohibition agents have given no indication of conducting a general campaign against mail extract purveyors, who Andrew J. Volstead, author of the dry act and now legal advisor to the north-west prohibition enforcement unit, has declared are violating section 18 of the dry law.

Enforcement of prohibition gained two per cent during the ending last June 30 over the preceding year, the commissioner said, adding that convictions during the year were 70 1/2 per cent of the indictments.

Roseburg Man Is Fatally Shot by Hunter of Deer

ROSEBURG, Ore., Oct. 10 (AP)—Lloyd Davis, 26 years old, was killed yesterday afternoon when he was mistaken for a deer by his hunting companion, Elwood Strader. Davis and another hunter, George Bradburn, had started on one course, and Strader, who was more familiar with the territory, took another route around a point, a meeting place, having been arranged by Davis and Bradburn last night and came out above where Strader expected them to appear and Strader, seeing the light tan shirt worn by Davis, fired the shot which penetrated Davis' right lung. The wounded man lost consciousness completely and died in about 35 minutes.

Bradburn started out in the nearest telephone about six miles away, but being unfamiliar with the territory, lost his way. Strader, who had remained with the body, became convinced that Bradburn was lost, and, slipping off all his clothing except underwear, ran the full distance to the telephone and called help in bringing out the body, which was brought to Roseburg shortly before day light this morning.

Mr. Davis was the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Davis of this city, and spent practically his entire life here. He graduated from the public schools of this city and then obtained employment with the Southern Pacific company. He operated a service station in this city for about a year, and then went to Klamath Falls for a short time where he was engaged in garment work. He returned to Roseburg about two months ago and resumed his work with the railroad company.
