Miss Mona McLellan, London "Mystery Mermaid" in Water 13 Hours

FOLKESTONE, England, Oct. 11 (AP)—Gertude Ederle's record channel swim of 14 hours and 31 minutes was bettered today by Miss Mona McLellan, London's "mystery swimmer," who landed at Folkestone at 8:50 o'clock this morning after swimming from Cape Gris Nez in 13 hours and 19 minutes.

Miss McLellan, the fourth woman to swim the channel, walked ashore at Folkestone beach at 8:52 o'clock this morning. The channel was calm throughout the night but very cold and a stiff northwest wind sprang up during the early hours.

Miss McLellan, whose real name is Dorothy Cochrane Logan, practicing physician of Harley street, London, entered the water at Cape Gris Nez yesterday at 7:40 p. m. She was the second woman to conquer the English channel in recent days, making the swim on her fifth attempt only a few days after Mrs. Mary Bookwith, of Chiklis, had succeeded in making the crossing, after repeated failures.

## MAROON ELEVEN DEFEATS JOSEPH

Score 31 to 0 with Second String Players in Part of the Contest

UNION, Ore., Oct. 11 (Special)—After suffering defeat at the hands of the Hereford boys in their first game of the season, Union high's football eleven came back strong in the encounter with the Joseph lineup on the local ground Saturday afternoon, defeating the visitors to the score of 31 to 0. At no time in the game was the Joseph team close to the goal line.

Joseph opened the game by kicking and Union immediately began smushing her way across the field mainly by line bucks and end runs. Within ten minutes Union had forced its way across the goal line for a touchdown. Joseph had the ball about two minutes of the first quarter and after trying a pass was twice downed behind the line, losing ten yards in the two attempts to buck. Another six points secured in the quarter gave Union a good lead, Glenn Miller carrying the ball back 29 yards after Joseph kicked, Delap catching a long pass, and making another ten yards before he was stopped, and Miller making a wide end run to another touchdown. This second six points were secured much quicker than the first one. In the second half Maroon and White forced its way across two-thirds of the field and soon added another touchdown to the score. The remainder of this quarter resulted in very little advantage to either team.

In the second half Coach Colburn began sending in second string men and it was at this time that Joseph made her main yardage. She was rapidly making her way across the field when the ball was snapped back too high for the Joseph player to catch it and Union pounced on it 22 yards behind the line of scrimmage. Soon Union was routine away to the goal line, but were called back on account of offside penalty. Another long end run carried the ball across and this time the local team secured the extra point, connecting with a pass. During the third quarter Colburn sent most of the regulars back for a few minutes play, but this was after the lighter line had forced its way across the goal line for a fifth score. The final score was Union 31, Joseph 0. The Wallawa county boys were game players and good sportsmen, battling through a long game but playing consistently to the final whistle.

The coach of the Haines high school referred his work was very satisfactory to both teams. Next Saturday the Union eleven will meet the North Powder team on the latter's ground.

Students at a Missouri college have presented school authorities with a petition asking that an afternoon nap be made part of the course. Probably they just want it made official.

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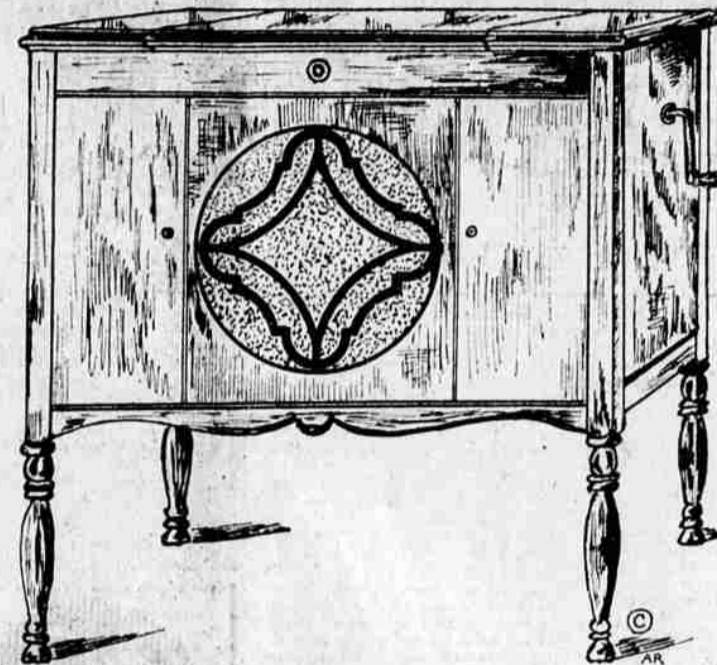

**C. W. Nessly Was  
Born Here Early  
In Year of 1863**  
SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 11 (Special)—Charles W. Nessly died at his home at Berrydale, in this county, Wednesday night, Oct. 5, after a long illness resulted from a severe attack of influenza last spring. He had been confined to his bed since May. The funeral was held at Kent, Friday afternoon, and was largely attended. The body was cremated.  
Mr. Nessly was a native westerner, having been born in La Grande, Ore., in 1863, being the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jacob Nessy, one of the earliest families to settle in the Grande Ronde valley. He was married there, to Cora J. Hunt, in 1891, but had lived in Washington for about 16 years. He was the youngest of a large family and was the only one born after his parents settled in the Grande Ronde valley in 1862, his

father having given up 220 acres of land where Portland now stands, to emigrate to the Grande Ronde valley after deciding there would never be a future to the wet Willamette valley.  
Mr. Nessly leaves his widow, two sons Leo and Wesley, both of whom were born in La Grande, four grandsons, three brothers, Frank, of Berrydale; John and Homer, of Spokane; and one sister, Mrs. Mary Bookwith, of Chiklis. Mr. Nessly had the unique distinction, for so far west, of having been born, reared and married in the same home, the old Nessly homestead about one and a half miles from La Grande. Mrs. Ed Kelly, of La Grande, is a niece of Mr. Nessly and the only one of the Ness' family now living there.

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
