

EGG MARKET IS STILL GOING UP

Butter Prices Firm—Supply of Apples Good, Selling Around \$1.50

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 12 (AP).—The Portland wholesale egg market continues its gradual rise to higher prices, with today's business on the dairy exchange showing extras up to 10c per dozen, mediums up to 2c to 3c and undersized advanced 2c to 3c. Fresh receipts have been small since the first of the week.

The butter market is also reported firm on all grades and exchange prices for today show a cent gain for cube, firsts to 40c per pound.

Country dressed meats and poultry were selling at unchanged prices in the morning's opening.

Shoebath trade, local receipts have been pretty well cleaned up but new receipts have held the supply strong and prices down.

Loose, or unwrapped, pack apples are being received in considerable quantities of various seasons.

Local tomatoes are showing better color and condition. Good stock was moving at 10c per box.

Excellent 4 1/2 lb. boxes of baby grapes are quoted at \$1.40 to \$1.50 per box, and local concord were in large supply at \$1.

A small lot of butter pears from southern Oregon, wrapped and packed, were priced at \$2 per box.

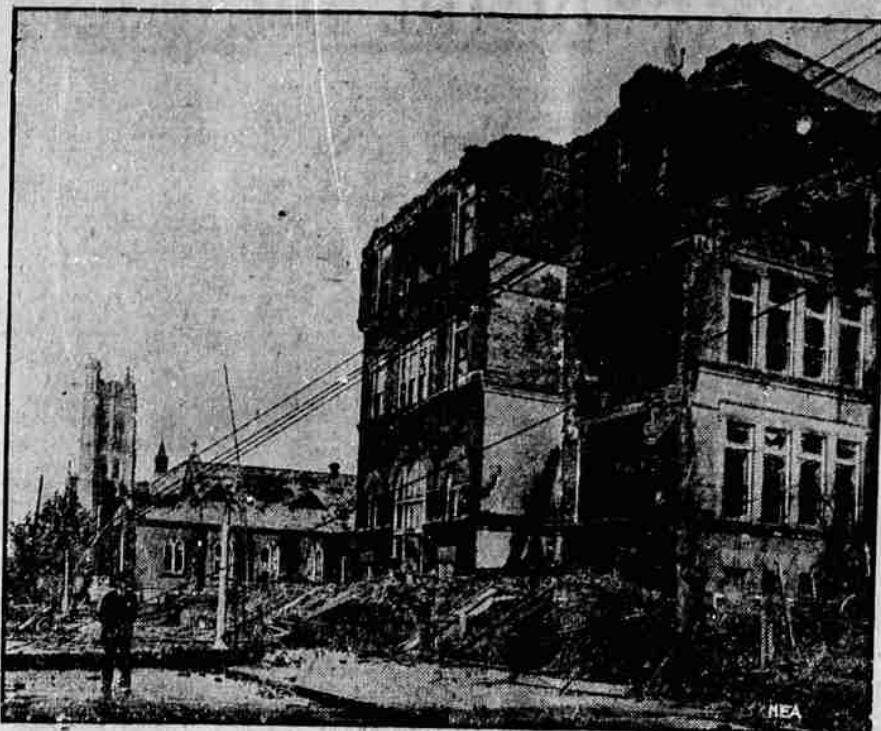

TUBERCULOSIS IS CURABLE.

Tuberculosis is now known to be a preventable disease. It is a comparatively easy matter to control the sources of infection if we can get the cooperation of the public.

In order that one shall not be a source of infection, the diagnosis of his disease at its early stage is important. Consequently, we hope that the time is not far distant when every individual who has a cold that lasts more than a month, a dry hacking cough, expectation of bloody sputum, unexplained loss of appetite, loss of weight, loss of strength, or nervousness will feel it his duty to present himself to those who he knows are specially trained to examine him for the presence of tuberculosis.

When a diagnosis is made the patient should be rigidly instructed to avoid infectious talking and laughing and to cover his mouth with some cheap paper or gauze each time he coughs or sneezes. This paper or cloth should then be deposited in a receptacle which, when full, should be burned with its contents. He should also be instructed to deposit all sputum in containers that can be destroyed. If these instructions are diligently followed, the patient will be no great source of danger to anyone about him.

To eliminate the danger of infection from cow's milk, the milkers should be clean and healthy and should be housed in clean, well-ventilated buildings. They should also be periodically tested for the presence of tuberculosis. If there is any doubt, the milk should be pasteurized.

Tuberculosis in its early stages is curable. However, if patients, through neglect or carelessness, allow their disease to drift into the advanced stages, tuberculosis is one of the most incurable diseases.

For some unknown reason many people who have tuberculosis do queer things. They avoid those who they know are in a position to give them the right advice. They chase rainbows by expecting some mys-

tery cure or quick who promises them everything or anything to cure them of their disease. Or they wander about expecting some fountain of youth or special climate to relieve them of responsibility and restore them to health.

There is no one man cure. Climate alone is a very disappointing factor in overcoming the disease. There is no mystery about the treatment of tuberculosis. It has been worked out so that today it is a clear cut procedure. The fundamental factors in the treatment are physical, mental and emotional rest, followed by carefully regulated exercise, pure fresh air, intelligent feeding, and favorable climatic conditions. In other words, the treatment is essentially a mapping out of a course of living with special attention to details as they may apply to each individual.

Scientific medicine has shown tuberculosis to be a preventable disease and the sources of infection to be relatively easy to control. It has shown tuberculosis to be a curable disease and that the treatment is definite. It remains for the public to familiarize itself with these facts.
