## Mrs. Barnes Pays Visit to O. E. S. Of Union County

The visit to La Grande last evening of Mrs. Margaret Barnes, of Grants Pass, Ore., worthy grand matron of the grand chapter of Oregon, of the Order of the Eastern Star, was the motive for the gathering together of more than 200 members of that order, and for one of the most interesting sessions which this particular group has participated in for some time. It called for an assembling of all the chapters of the county in a district meeting, and there were present goodly representations from the Blue Mountain chapter, No. 52, of Elgin, Cherry chapter, No. 123, of Cove, Grande Ronde Valley chapter, No. 49, of Elgin, and the "Ladies of Hope" chapter, No. 13, of La Grande.

The program of the evening commenced with a splendid banquet at the Hotel Foley, attended by about 100 persons from over the valley. Four long tables accommodated the guests who were served a banquet of four courses. Dr. Joe Ingie, worthy patron of the local chapter, acting as toastmaster, introduced at intervals during the evening several prominent members of the order, who spoke briefly and very interestingly. The first speaker was the honored guest, Mrs. Barnes, who in the few words of greeting, and by a most winsome manner which bespoke a very attractive personality, at once won all of her hearers. She was followed by Robert S. Eakin, of La Grande, master of grand lodge of the state of Oregon; George Cochran, grand secretary of the grand chapter of the Eastern Star of Oregon, and Mrs. Emma Kiddle, of Island City, introduced not only because of her own prominent record as a member and officer of the Eastern Star but because of her relationship to others who have, in the past, gained prominence or are now prominent in the order.

Immediately following the banquet, the company adjourned to the Masonic temple where they were joined by more than 100 additional members, eligible to sit in the deliberations and work of the evening. The hall was tastefully decorated for the event, fall flowers having been generously and effectively used. The opening work was put on by Mrs. Minnie E. Hodgkin, worthy matron of Hope chapter. Dr. Joe Ingie, worthy patron and their splendid representative officers, who conducted their own business session, since last evening was their regular meeting night. One item of business of unusual importance, was the report of the advisory board, that the Order of the Rainbow for Girls would be instituted in La Grande on Saturday evening, Oct. 22, when the officers of the assembly at The Dalles, together with Robert S. Tipton, of Portland, grand deputy, would be present to conduct the work of the organization, install the officers and exemplify the initiatory work. To this program all Masons and Eastern Stars, in good standing, were invited.

As different orders, in the routine, were called for last evening the chapters from over the county were asked to assist. Working under their worthy matron, Mrs. Cross, of Elgin, who was properly introduced and escorted, officers of Blue Mountain chapter had charge of the introduction of prominent visitors. Among those so introduced and escorted were Worthy Grand Matron Mrs. Barnes, Master of the Grand Lodge Robert S. Eakin, Grand Sentinel George Cochran, past grand orator of Idaho, W. W. The initiatory work was exemplified by the degree team from Union and so well was it done that it elicited the applause and warm words of praise from the entire audience. Each one of the officers appeared to have his or her lines perfectly and carried out their part almost faultlessly, which is not an easy thing to do, all the company agreed, when the spectators, as is the case at such a time, are usually more critically inclined.

Late in the evening the worthy grand matron was introduced as the speaker. Quite briefly, but in an intensely fascinating manner, Mrs. Barnes spoke somewhat of the history of the order and then offered some helpful suggestions to the officers. In behalf of the chapters of the district, and in a very happy little speech, Dr. Ingie presented to the distinguished visitor a gift, as a token of the regard which the chapters and their individual members have for her. Mrs. Barnes responded with much feeling. The concluding speakers were George T. Cochran and R. S. Eakin.

Following the closing of the chapter, the members of Hope chapter served open the dining room and served light refreshments to their guests. That the evening was one of profit as well as great pleasure was the consensus of all present.

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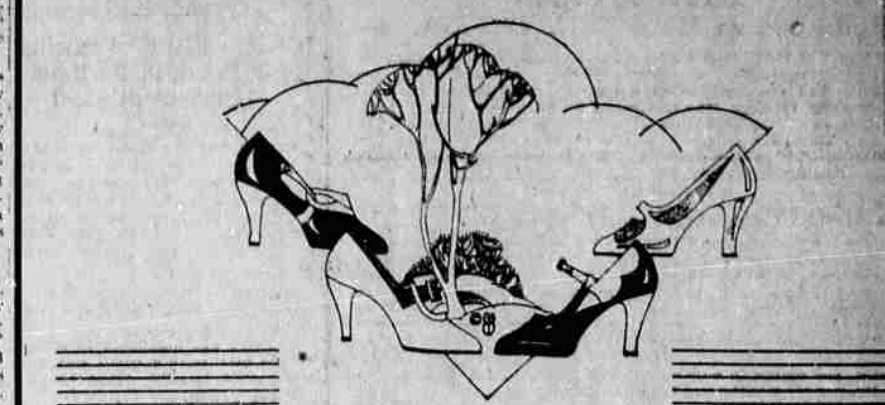

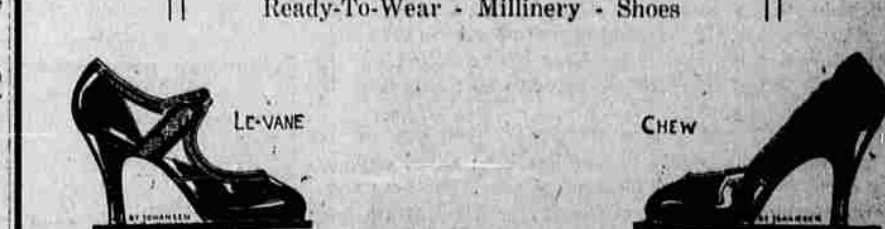
