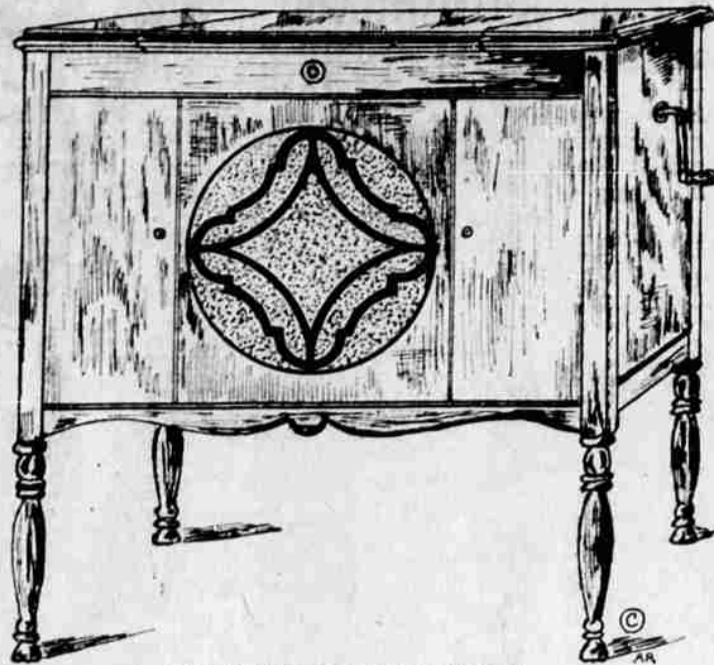

BRIDE CONQUERS CHANNEL WATER

is Third Woman to Swim
English Channel In
Less Than a Week

DOVER, England, Oct. 14 (AP)—The number of successful English channel swimmers was raised to 14 when Mrs. Ivy Gill, of Sheffield, landed at Shakespeare beach near here shortly after midnight this morning the third woman to perform the feat in less than a week.

Mrs. Gill, 24 years old, typist and only recently a bride, started from Cape Gris Nez France at 9:11 p. m. yesterday and landed on the English coast at 12:28 a. m. today. She was exhausted at the finish of the long grind and her first words on reaching shore were: "I can't stand."

The manager, trainer and boatman who accompanied her announced that they were ready to sign affidavits as to the authenticity of the swim.

The time of 15 hours 5 minutes is one hour 25 minutes slower than the record for women claimed by Dr. Dorothy Cochrane Logan (Mona McMillan) of 12 hours 19 minutes and is 25 minutes slower than the mark of 14 hours and 21 minutes set by Gertrude Ederle.

Her victory brings the number of women channel swimmers to five, as against nine for the men.

GUSTAFSON AND GRANGE

CHICAGO (AP)—The town of Wheaton, Ill., which has not had much attention in sport since Red Grange galloped out of intercollegiate football, is anticipating another ride on the sport page this fall. It is represented on Western conference gridirons by Vic Gustafson, captain at Northwestern, and by Garland Grange, Red's younger brother at the University of Illinois.

Of Gustafson the Wildcats expect great things. He is a plunging, lightning lightning who would have made a greater name last season but for the overshadowing fame of "Moon" Baker. Coach Zuppke of the Illini expects to find Grange if a help, and maybe a regular, in the Illinois backfield. Grange generally plays halfback, and sometimes end.
