Tigers to Face Second High School Eleven of Year Tomorrow

In their first appearance of the season before local fans the Tigers will meet the Enterprise High school tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock on the high school athletic field. With a game at Walla Walla last Saturday in which the local players came out on the short end of the score and a practice game with the alumni during the week to offer as previous experience, Coach Ralph Christie will match his squad against the Enterprise red and blacks, who are reputed to be considerably heavier than La Grande's Tigers. Moreover, according to information which the coach has gathered, Enterprise has an experienced team and lost but a few letters last year.

"Since the Walla Walla game, however, some rather changes in the line up have been made and some tough practice has taken place," said the coach in announcing his probable squad this morning. Bieckle, Paus, Price, Evans, Kumsawa and Harlow will probably see action in the backfield, while Roe, Charleston and Sager at ends, P. Newlin, Bauman, Rees, Buchanan, at guards, and Bruce or V. Newlin, at center, are expected to get into the game. Jimmy Rosenbaum is to be referee.

The senior class presented a pep stunt this afternoon when a pep assembly was held for the Enterprise-La Grande football game tomorrow afternoon. Characters in the stunt, which was based on Edward the Great, the famous English monarch, were the game, followed by Buchanan, as the dreamer, Joe Sayre as an Enterprise player and Joan Anderson as a La Grande player.

Addresses were heard from Supl. J. T. Longfellow and H. Dads W. C. Perkins and W. P. McAdory. Tubby Zundel, last year's student body president and football player, also talked to the students. Short talks from William Bieckle, Mattie Baker, Roy Kumsawa and Robert Evans, sound members, were also heard. Lawrence Bay, yell leader, with Earl Ford and Joan Anderson, his assistants, led in yell and songs and in class yell competition.

American Airmen Believed Held By Nicaraguans

MANAGUA, Nicaragua, Oct. 14 (AP)—Two American Marine Corps aviators who disappeared while on patrol duty in Northern Nicaragua are believed to be held by bandits. Second Lieut. E. A. Thomas, of Richmond, Ind., and Sergeant Frank E. Dowdell, of Carbondale, Ill., were patrolling the Ocuilal district in the department of Nueva Segovia when their machine crashed and burned near Mount Chapote. The crew of another patrol plane said they saw both men run from the wreckage of the plane. Attempts to reach them, however, were frustrated when a rescue party was attacked by about 250 bandits.

Eight Cities Seek 1928 G. O. P. Caucus

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 14 (AP)—Eight cities are on the list to compete with San Francisco for the 1928 republican convention. William H. Crocker, California member of the republican national committee, was told in a letter received today from Ray O. West of Chicago, secretary of the committee.

Cleveland, Detroit, Chicago, Kansas City, Minneapolis, Omaha, Seattle, San Antonio and San Francisco have notified West they will send representatives to the republican party meeting in Washington D. C., Dec. 6 with instructions to fight for the convention.

Four-Alarm Fire In San Francisco

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 14 (AP)—Hundreds of men and women fled from adjoining buildings today as a four-alarm noonday fire broke out in the 800 block on Harrison street, between Fourth and Fifth streets. The fire which started in a stable when harness dressing boiler over on a stove caused damage estimated at \$40,000. The main entrance will be from Fourth street, and there will be a small entrance hall before going into the gymnasium proper. Stairs will lead from here to the downstairs floor. There will also be an outside entrance from the downstairs floor at the back of the building, and two fire escapes at each of the rear corners of the building.

Steel and Concrete—The building is being constructed of steel and concrete and will be fireproof throughout, conforming in every way to state specifications and requirements. About \$2,000 worth of steel will be put into the building, large steel beams supporting the building underneath with concrete pillars. A steel truss overhead will carry the roof of the building. The finish of the building will either be stucco or painted concrete.

AMSTERDAM, Oct. 14 (AP)—The Hinkel hydroplane D-1220 en route to the U. S. by way of the Azores, arrived here at 1:55 p. m. from Wilhelmsaven, completing the first lap of its flight.

HORTA, Island of Fayal, Azores, Oct. 14 (AP)—The Junkers plane D-1220 arrived here safely at 2:15 o'clock local time from Lisbon.

LISBON, Portugal, Oct. 14 (AP)—Lili Dillenz, Viennese actress, who is a passenger aboard the Junkers plane D-1220, today expressed the hope before starting off for the Azores that she would meet Ruth Elder, co-pilot of the "American Girl" at Horta.

The Junkers hydro airplane D-1220 hopped off from Noederney, Germany, on Oct. 4 for trans-Atlantic flight to the United States by way of the Azores. The plane made its first lap to Amsterdam without difficulty and the next day left for Lisbon. The plane was forced to descend, because of fog, at Santa Cruz near Lisbon. It was towed into the Lisbon harbor next day but made the last portion of the trip by air.

BAKAR, SENEGAL, Oct. 14 (AP)—Boudoune Costes and Lieut. Joseph LeRiz French aviators, hopped off at 6:23 o'clock this morning on the trans-Atlantic section of their flight from Paris to Buenos Aires. Their immediate destination is Port Natal, Brazil, a distance of about 2000 miles.
