Marking Up of Call Money Rate Checking Rally

NEW YORK, Oct. 14 (AP)—Marking up of the call money rate from 4 to 4 1/2 per cent coincident with the calling of about \$15,000,000 in back loans checked a promising rally in today's stock market. Early gains ran from 1 to 7 points, and were distributed over a fairly broad list.

General Motors yielded to pressure after an early display of strength, but Hudson, which has been weak for a few days, rallied briskly on short covering.

Public utilities turned heavy when heavy offerings appeared in American Telephone, Jewel Tea and Lambert advanced to new high grounds. Coppers were firm.

Heavy accumulation of Erie common, which advanced 3 points in the early afternoon started a brisk buying movement in the eastern coasts. Chesapeake corporation, Pittsburgh and West Virginia and Jersey Central all sold 2 to 3 points higher.

U. S. Steel showed little recuperative power and various other influential shares also dragged in the final hour when a number of stocks were pushed up violently. Midland Steel Products preferred rose 11 points and Cushman, Sons, 7, both to new peaks. General Asphalt was up 5 1/2 and Erie, Lambert, American Safety Razor, Shattuck and American Linsend 3 to 3 1/2. Total sales approximated 1,900,000 shares.

Strong Demand For Hogs, Veal; Mill Feed Is Up

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 14 (AP)—Business in the local wholesale markets for country dressed meats, live poultry, butter and eggs was very active today at prices generally unchanged from yesterday. Dealers reported a new strong demand for hogs and veal, enabling a good cleanup of stocks on hand and building prospects for a rising market the first of the coming week.

Market prices about steady on most lines of wholesale fresh fruits and vegetables.

A carload of grapes, the first of the season, from Grants Pass, were offered this morning for \$1.65 per crate. About 15 cars in all are expected from Josephine county.

Oregon Malaga grapes are offered at \$1 to \$1.25 per crate and Concord are in large supply at 2 1/2 to 4¢ per pound.

Portland dealers have announced an advance in price for mill feed of \$1 per ton, owing to scarcity of stocks on hand at the large northwest market centers. New quotations on mill run and middlings are \$35 and \$50, respectively, per ton for city delivery.

Softwood Lumber Buying Less Active

NEW YORK, Oct. 14 (AP)—Softwood lumber buying was slightly less active this week, compared with the week before, and hardwood orders were about the same, reports from 468 mills to the National Lumber Manufacturers' association show. A small increase in production, shipments about the same and some decrease in new business, were reported by 325 softwood mills for the week ended October 8, and operations of 128 hardwood mills showed an increase in production, with shipments and new business about the same as the preceding week. Unfilled orders of 220 southern pine and west coast mills at third of last week were 551,861,342 feet, against 55,841,213 feet the week before.

Husband Enters Not Guilty Plea to Death Charge

LONGVIEW, Wash., Oct. 14 (AP)—C. A. Young entered a plea of not guilty today to a charge of first degree murder for killing Rex Lacey at West Kelso last Friday. His written plea, entered in addition to a verbal plea, set out that Young was mentally irresponsible at the time of the slaying, but that this mental condition does not exist now.

Young's attorney, Howard Atwell, asked the court to docket Young's trial first on the calendar of the next jury term of court, starting Nov. 7.

Young was calm and collected as legal formalities were transacted and when returned to his cell. He had admitted the killing at the time, saying that Lacey had invaded his home, that he found Mrs. Young sitting on Lacey's lap, and that he had previously warned him.
