people. Since the amount was charged against the county no provision has been made for its retirement and no interest payments have been made.

Since the voting of the road bond issue in 1919 a total of 479.12 miles of road have been improved in the county, including 32.4 miles of state highway, which was built by the state and county together.

158 miles of surfaced rock or gravel roads built by the county, 35.5 miles of earth road improved by the county, 55.32 miles of surfaced rock or gravel market road, built by the state and county and 25.40 miles of market road, which has been graded according to market road standards, but not yet surfaced. There are 207 miles of unimproved county roads and 87.50 unimproved market roads remaining in the county, according to the last report issued by the state highway commission.

Budget Provisions
The county budget each year carries amounts for the maintenance of both the market roads and the county roads, the state matching the amount set aside for the maintenance of the market roads. The county has no warrant indebtedness, all warrants being taken care of as issued.

Lindsey Debates With Minister In Walla Walla

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Oct. 15 (AP)—Four women should be given the same chance to regulate the number of their children as rich women, Judge Ben Lindsey, of Denver, affirmed here in a debate last night with the Rev. H. S. Reichard, of Walla Walla on "Companionate Marriage."

"Poor women should be given the opportunity, which is now being monopolized by the wealthy, to regulate their progeny and determine how many children they are able to support," Lindsey declared. He said that companionate marriages, as he advocated it, would mean the legalization of birth control and divorce by mutual consent.

"Why not make those things legal?" he argued. "Birth control is already practiced by the majority of people in this country. Divorce is already easy to get. Why not give the people real, scientific information about sex. Why not eliminate all the hypocrisy, coercion and material expense that are necessary for a divorce now?"

Mr. Reichard, on the negative side, declared that divorce by mutual consent would tend to break down the stability of the home, and destroy the divine and ethical purpose of marriage. He did not dwell upon the phase of birth control longer than to declare that marriage is based "upon the discipline of the body and soul," and that birth control would encourage evasion of this discipline.

BRUSH FIRES BURNING
REDDING, Cal., Oct. 15 (AP)—Over 400 acres of brush and small timberland were swept yesterday by the which started along Charley creek 25 miles north of here, and five miles from the state highway. Fifty men were fighting the blaze, which was shooting up the slopes of Sugar Leaf mountain. The forest service hoped to check the flames at the summit.

**Klan Members in
Alabama Indicted**

LEVENE, Ala., Oct. 15 (AP)—One hundred and one indictments were returned today by the special grand jury which investigated masked violence in Crenshaw county.

All the indictments were against members of the Ku Klux Klan and all of the findings in Crenshaw county except one were committed by members of the Klan, the grand jury reported to Circuit Judge A. E. Gamble who presided at the investigation.

Among those indicted for felony in connection with the masked lynchings was Ira B. Thompson, Levene attorney and grand cyclops of the local Klan unit.

**Administration Is
Studying Farm Aid**

WASHINGTON, Oct. 15 (AP)—The administration is attempting to work out a sound solution of the agricultural problem. Chester H. Gray, Washington representative of the American federation, said today after a call at the white house.

Gray told President Coolidge that in his opinion the farmers still want the McNary-Haagen farm relief bill which he vetoed, but are willing to accept a few modifications so long as the equalization fee feature remains.

**Strikes Dynamite
Cap With Hammer**

SALTZEM, Ore., Oct. 15 (AP)—Curiosity as to the exact nature of dynamite caps almost cost the life of the 13-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. L. Arison, when he struck the explosive with a hammer. The lad's face was badly torn and the flesh torn from his left hand and right groin. Efforts are being made to save the sight of his right eye. The caps were found in the basement, presumably left by a former renter, and were taken to the porch for further examination. The boy was alone at the time but was found by a man visiting at a neighbors.

YOUNG ALBANIAN KILLS TSENA BEY

Minister to Jugo Slavia
and Czechoslovakia
Dies of Wounds

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia, Oct. 15 (AP)—After gulping three glasses of cognac, Agivalah Bek, a young Albanian, suddenly approached Tsen Bey, Albanian minister to Jugo Slavia and Czechoslovakia, in a cafe on the Weingarten street last night and fired two shots into his back. The minister died on the way to the hospital.

His deed accomplished, Bek calmly handed the revolver to a waiter, surrendered his passport to a policeman, and was taken away without resistance. To the police commissary he explained that he had killed Tsen Bey because he believed the minister intended to betray Albania to Jugo Slavia. Bek had been frequenting the cafe where the shooting took place, for three days. News of the assassination spread rapidly and caused a sensation.

Tsen Bey, already minister to Jugo Slavia, had been only recently named minister to Czechoslovakia as well. A brother-in-law to Ahmed Zogu, the Albanian president, he helped him depose former Premier Fan Noli and was at one time his commander-in-chief and minister of interior and foreign affairs. He was only 32 years old.

The police allege that his assassination had been in Prague but four days and that he came here direct from Rome, where he spent a week.
