Evangelist Ends First Week of Meetings Here

Dr. Theodore Copeland to Speak Both Morning and Evening at M. E. Church Tomorrow.

This Sunday ends the first week of evangelistic services at the First Methodist Episcopal church here, and Dr. Theodore Copeland, who is conducting the meetings, will speak both in the morning at 11 o'clock and during the evening hour of worship, which begins at 7:30 o'clock.

Dr. Copeland speaks at the church every evening with the exception of Saturday, and is attracting large audiences by his eloquent and interesting sermons.

There will also be special music Sunday at both services. In the evening W. W. Nussbaum, music director in the La Grande public schools, who has charge of the music for the evangelistic services, will have charge of the large chorus choir. The music will be a special feature of Sunday evening's meeting.

Bible school will meet at 9:45 o'clock Sunday morning and Dr. Copeland has consented to speak to both the senior and junior departments of the school. The Epworth League will meet at 6:30 o'clock in the parlors of the church.

The "Fate of Beauty" will be the subject of the morning sermon by the Rev. J. George Walls Sunday morning at the First Presbyterian church. Mrs. W. H. Bohnenkamp Jr., contralto, will sing a solo during the morning service.

In the evening, at 7:30 o'clock the pastor will bring a message to those asking the question "Does God Know Me?" This sermon continues the series on "Life's Problems." A young women's chorus choir will furnish music in the evening.

Delegates Home After Attending District Meeting

Eugene and La Grande Ask for Next Year's Convention of Columbia District League.

Four delegates from the English Lutheran church of La Grande and the Rev. L. H. Aves, pastor of the church, returned to their homes here this week from the Dallas, where they attended the 27th annual convention of the Columbia district Lutheran League, which was held there last Friday Saturday and Sunday. The delegates from the local church were Mrs. J. G. Stritzinger, Miss Helen Jensen, Miss Lillian Lund, and Miss Pauline Clausen.

At the opening session an interesting address was given by the Rev. Carl Alm, of Astoria. Saturday morning reports were heard from district officers and standing committees. The following officers were elected for the new year: Miss Olive Abrahamson, Portland, president; Ralph Lundbeck, Vancouver, vice president; Robert Austen, The Dalles, corresponding secretary; Miss Esther Hermans, Vancouver, recording secretary; and Miss Victoria Kummer, Portland, treasurer.

The Dallas Lutheran League won the president's banner for having secured the greatest number of points for the efficiency goals. The league is able to hold the banner for two successive years becomes the permanent owner of the banner, but so far no league with in the district has been able to do this.

Issue Invitation
The new leagues of Salem and Eugene joined the Columbia district during the convention. Invitations were issued by Eugene and La Grande for next year's convention. The final decision will be made by the executive committee.

Helpful conferences were held on Saturday afternoon on the various phases of league work and Saturday evening a social time was enjoyed.

Sunday morning the Rev. F. S. Beitel, pastor of the Lutheran University church, of Eugene, preached the convention sermon. The Rev. L. H. Aves, as convention chaplain, led the service and installed the newly elected officers of the district league during the morning. In the afternoon the delegates were taken on a sight-seeing route, and at 5:30 the last session of the convention was held, which was in the form of a model Lutheran League meeting, led by The Dalles league.

The Columbia District Lutheran League has been attracting much favorable attention from other united organizations of the nation, because of its progressive methods and high standard of efficiency which have prevailed during the past years. Since 1922 the district league has published its own monthly paper, "The Columbia District Bulletin."

Preaching Mission To Start at Cove

COVE, Ore., Oct. 15. (Special)—The Ascension Episcopal church of Cove, founded 51 years ago, is to have a preaching mission beginning Sunday, Oct. 16, and continuing until 23, the missioner of which will be an African chief.

Strange as it may seem, however, the chief is white. He is the Rev. Francis H. Ball, of Bond, Ore., a man who is a veteran of two wars and who had extensive business experience before entering the ministry. He has given addresses in many of the large cities of this country and has had the unusual experience of being made a chief of the Basuto nation in Africa. Mr. Ball's father was a missionary to the Basutos and he was the first white child born in Basuto land.

He will bring a message which will be of special interest to men and boys. Services will be at 11 o'clock Sunday morning and during the week will be held in the evenings, beginning at 7:30 o'clock. All are cordially invited to attend.

Services, which begin at 7:30 o'clock, will be held at the Methodist church. "The Father and the Child" will be the subject on which the Rev. J. A. Hall, pastor of the Methodist Episcopal church south will speak Sunday morning during the 11 o'clock worship hour. This will follow Sunday school at 9:45 o'clock.

Both the senior and intermediate leagues will meet at 8 o'clock in order to finish in time to attend the evangelistic meeting at the First Methodist Episcopal church, conducted by Dr. Copeland. There will be no evening church services at the Methodist church south.

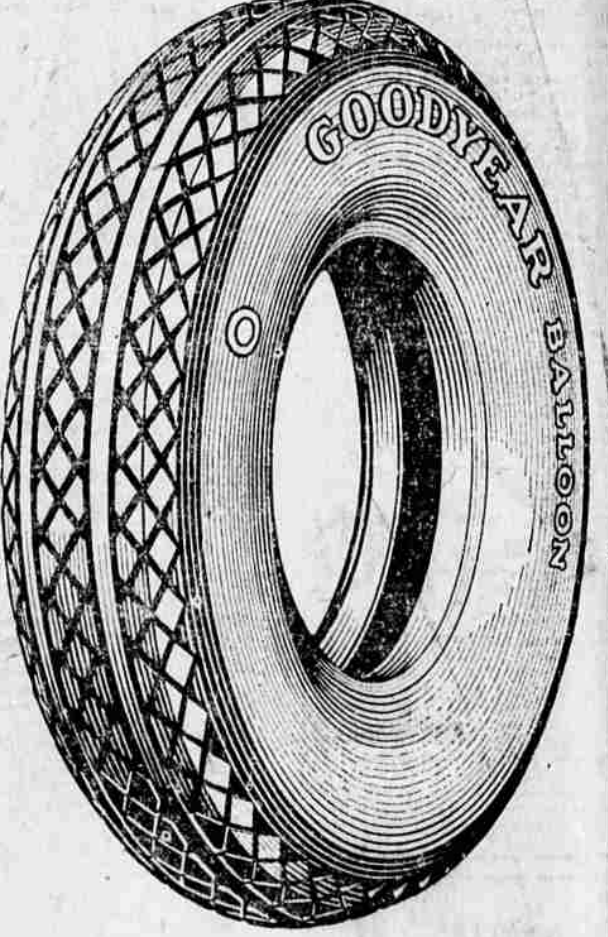
