he dislikes is here to stay.

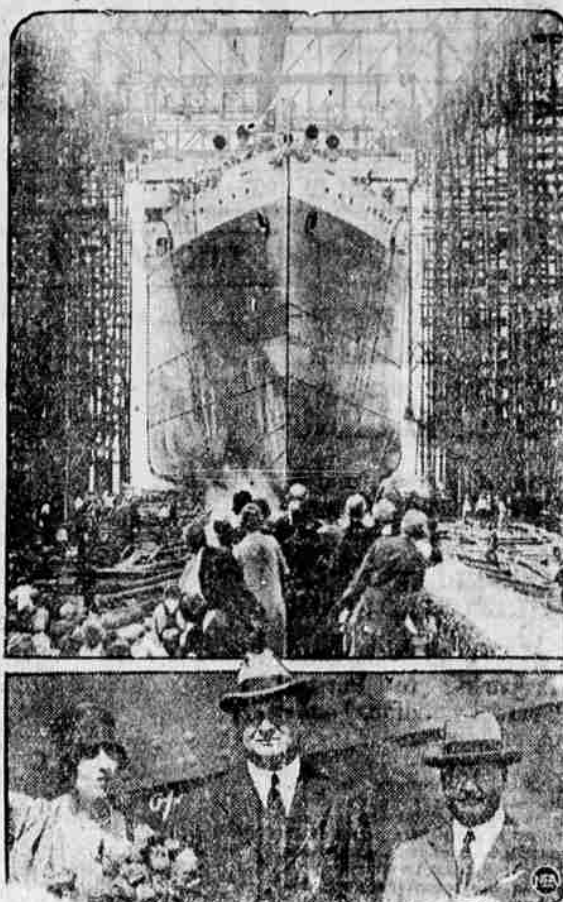

Science, Adapted to Rural Life, Is Bringing New Social Era to Farm

WASHINGTON (AP).—Rural
America is on the threshold of a
"second life."
It will be better than the first,
says Dr. C. J. Galpin, chief of the
division of farm population and
rural life in the department of
agriculture, in that it will be one
of applied science.

"Science," he asserts, "will char-
acterize a second period in the na-
tion's rural life and will stand
forth as the genius of its culture."
Although this scientific habit of
mind now pertains almost solely to
agriculture and some practices of
housekeeping, Dr. Galpin observes
that a condition established in one
department sooner or later be-
comes operative in all departments
of living, and that the effects of
what ever science the farmer now
practices may be looked for in due
time not only in crops but in hu-
man beings as well. The farmer's
response to science, as applied to
the economics of his occupation,
appears as a herald of his science,
applied to all his human relation-
ships.

As evidence of the trend in this
direction, he cites such examples
as farmers' hospitals, rural librar-
ies, modern homes, community
club houses, athletic fields and
swimming pools, consolidated
schools, camping grounds, rural
churches of distinction, and mod-
ernized country towns where mer-
chandising has been put upon a
scientific basis of service and help-
ful advertising, all "logical out-
growths of agricultural science."
In higher education too, the
trend appears. From 1917 to 1927
colleges and university students
studying rural sociology increased
from perhaps 2,000 to an esti-
mated 20,000, absorbing the theory
that controllable facts make rural
sociology what it is.

Secretary of Agriculture Jardine,
commenting on the same phase of
rural life, declares that average
farmer of today knows more of
the science upon which his indus-

try rests, and brings it into more
constant application, than the
scientist of 50 years ago.

Rather than becoming a negli-
gible and disappearing factor in
American life, says Doctor Galpin,
the farmer, because of his "scien-
tific attitude of mind, and espe-
cially his scientific grasp of human
relationships, is bound to save
and already is starting to save
rural society for a social role which
will be a noble sequel to its so-
cial pioneer role during the first
200 years of our history."

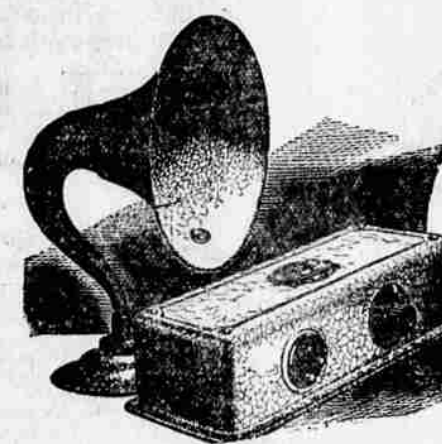
