

STOCK EXCHANGE IN UPWARD TURN

Prices Recover Sturdily in Final Hour of Trade in Wall Street

NEW YORK, Oct. 19 (AP)—Stock prices recovered sturdily in the final hour of today's market after heavy declines had followed a firm opening. General Motors, U. S. Steel, International Telephone, Radio Corporation and several others made up part of their early losses, while Houston Oil recovered all of its six point decline.

Green Canyon Copper had a net gain of 6 points and Washoe was up 2 1/2 on the day. Erie common rallied from a low of 65 1/2 to 65. Lodge brothers preferred went up about 2 points from its year's low at 65 1/2.

Wheat Steady At Slight Decline

Butter and Egg Quotations Are Unchanged Today

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 19 (AP)—Wholesale butter and egg quotations were unchanged for today on the dairy exchange listings and the day's early trade was fairly active with strong demand for light supplies of top grades.
Live poultry and country dressed meat prices were generally steady in today's early wholesale trade except that the market for choice veal was firmer, selling readily at 17c per pound. Dealers were asking 18c for the very best offerings and getting 17c in a very small way.
Best combination grade Yukon potatoes were selling at around 10c lower at \$1.50 per sack and U. S. No. 1's were being sold for \$1.65, a like decline. Outside potato receipts were heavy but little local stuff is arriving as yet.
Large supplies of local colery sold at slightly lower figures; 75, 60 and 50c per dozen heads, according to size and quality.

Fruit, Vegetable Shipments at Peak

CHICAGO, Oct. 19 (AP)—Fruit and vegetable shipments are now at the peak for 1927, the government bureau of agricultural economics reported today.
According to official figures, total shipments for the last week would make a solid train reaching from Chicago to St. Louis, approximately 275 miles. The train would consist of about 35,000 cars and would contain at least 15,000,000 bushels of produce, an average of five quarts of fruits and vegetables for every person in the United States.

Greater Supply of Coffee Seen in South America

RIO DE JANEIRO (AP)—Railroads and highways built through the section bordering the Parana river valley in the state of Sao Paulo have in less than a decade opened to cultivation a fertile area believed to be capable of producing nearly twice as great as the world's present visible supply.

The region, larger in area than all Belgium, lies in the valleys of the Parapanema and Parana rivers and their tributaries, the Harare, Cinzas, Tibary, Pirapo and Feary rivers. It was learned at the American consulate here.

Coffee culture now is limited to the district between the Harare and Laraninha rivers, an area of about 2,500 square kilometers, but it is estimated that this section alone is capable of accommodating 200,000,000 coffee trees and producing 10,000,000 bags yearly. The world's visible supply has not since 1914 exceeded that amount, and during the present year has ranged less than 5,000,000 bags.

Coffee production has increased in this area from virtually none a decade ago to 157,846 bags last year, the crop being valued at \$2,500,000, with about \$100,000 accruing to the state as export taxes. The section already has experienced a real estate "boom," and which a few years ago sold for 20 cents an acre now bringing \$4 to \$10.

Rainier Council Forced To Meet

LONGVIEW, Wash., Oct. 15 (AP)—The first council meeting in more than two months in the politically-torn river town of Rainier, Ore., was held last night. The meeting followed a mandamus action in circuit court at St. Helens by A. E. Veatch, publisher of the Rainier Review, commanding members of the council to meet to take action on his protest of the election August 15 in which he was recalled as mayor and Edward Haugberg was ousted as councilman.

Adverse action was taken on Veatch's protest, an action which had practically been served upon the council met. It is reported, with the understanding that Veatch would carry the matter to circuit court.
C. C. Clark, one of the anti-Veatch council members who absented himself from all meetings since the August 15 recall, resigned at last night's session. Mrs. A. M. Lee, the other incumbent, had indicated she may resign at another meeting tonight. W. L. Marshall, wood dealer, was appointed to succeed Haugberg. Refusing to recognize the recall, Haugberg resigned last night.
