SHOWING FIGHT FILMS IS LEGAL

New York Judge Rules Display All Right If Not Received Illegally

NEW YORK, Oct. 20 (AP)—Eight films can be exhibited legally in New York or any other state, according to an opinion today by United States District Court Judge Henry W. Goddard.

Judge Goddard also ruled that exhibitors receiving fight films from persons other than common carrier or through the mails, may display them without becoming accessories to an offense against the interstate transportation law.

Judge Goddard's ruling was made in answer to questions put to him by the federal grand jury investigating moving pictures of the federal grand jury investigating moving pictures of the Tunney-Dempsey championship bout at Chicago.

At the federal building it was stated that the jury will proceed to devote its attention to efforts to locate those who transported the films into the state.

Goddard's Opinion

Judge Goddard's opinion said in part: "One not participating in the transportation into the state of such film and who merely receives it from a person who is not a common carrier or express company or agent thereof, though the one receiving it has knowledge that the person from whom he received it did transport it into the state, had committed no crime under the statute, though he may have intended to distribute or exhibit the film."

The judge held that it was not illegal to exhibit in this district a film "portraying an encounter of pugilists" in another state, nor was it illegal to receive such a film "from one who has brought such film into this district but who is not an express company or other common carrier or an agent of an express company or other common carrier."

He declared also that the person who received a fight film in this district from another state, intending to sell or distribute it, was not guilty of being an accessory after the fact.
