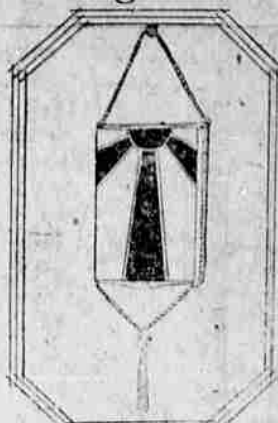

## MENUS

By Sister Mary

BREAKFAST — Grapefruit, cereal, cream, scrambled eggs with dried beef, bran muffins, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON — Cauliflower au gratin, roasted muffins, apple sauce, ginger bread, milk, tea.

DINNER — Casserole of chicken, white baked sweet potatoes, creamed corn, jellied cucumber salad, peach sherbet, sponge cake, milk, coffee.

Peach Sherbet

Seven or eight ripe peaches, 1 1/2

cups sugar, 2 oranges, 3 cups water, 1-3 cup lemon juice, 1 egg white, 1 tablespoon granulated gelatine, 4 tablespoons cold water, few grains salt.

Put peaches and remove stones. Put into sauce pan, add water and sew until tender. Rub through a sieve and add lemon juice, orange juice and sugar. Heat, stirring constantly until sugar is dissolved and boiling point is reached. Stir in gelatine softened in cold water for five minutes and dissolve over boiling water. Remove from fire and fold 1 white of egg beaten until stiff and dry with a few grains of salt. Turn into mold, pack in ice and salt and freeze for two or three hours. Serve garnished with sliced peaches and whipped cream if desired.

## The Garden

Plant groups of snow drops where they may be seen from a south window. Against a warm wall they often bloom as early as February when a thaw comes along.

Saw hardy annuals for early bloom next spring. Sow thinly and save the work of thinning next spring.

Get in narcissus bulbs as soon as they arrive from the dealer. Do not delay them. Tulips and hyacinths can wait. Narcissus need all the growing time they can get.

It is better to buy new seed than to try to save seed of annuals as the commercially grown seed is more carefully selected and will come truer to type. There is too much chance for cross fertilization by bees in the home garden to keep strains true.

Dig dahlias as soon as frost blackens the leaves. Do not let them stand out for repeated freezing.

Gladiolus bulbs may be dug any time after they bloom. It is best not to leave them for a heavy frost.
