EUREKA SCHOOLS CLOSED

EUREKA, Cal., Oct. 20 (AP)—
All Eureka's elementary and sec-
ondary schools have been ordered
closed for an indefinite period be-
cause of a flare-up of the infantile
paralysis epidemic which has
claimed nine lives in Humboldt
county. The Area board of
health issued a similar order, ex-
cepting college students in the
state teachers college.

Marshfield was stricken with the
disease and is in a very serious
condition.

The schools of Coos county still
remain open as most of the cases
are pre-school age.

While Inez Frederick, 16, was

tected from all visitors but mem-
bers of her family, officers were
looking for Miss Walters, 14, who
disappeared from her Hood River
home Monday at the same time
that Inez vanished.

Nothing definite has been dis-
closed officially to account for the
movements of Inez from the time
she disappeared until she jumped
or fell from a freight train early
yesterday at Cascade Locks. One
report said she and the Walters
girl said they played hooky Mon-
day and went to an orchard to pick
apples.

Officers were trying to run down

Miss Walters is 14 years old but,
according to descriptions furnish-
ed by Hood River officials, looks
to be about 18. She is rather tall,
weighs about 145 pounds. Her
hair is light brown and her eyes
are hazel. When last seen she
was wearing a dark blue flannel
"middy." Her complexion is fair.
