CAPTAIN'S NAME HEARD IN TRIAL

Coast Guard Commandant Accused of Giving "Runners" Protection

SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 20 (AP).—The name of Captain Frederick G. Dodge, retired coast guard commandant, has been mentioned in federal court here in connection with the reputed operation of what is declared by the government as a million dollar liquor smuggling conspiracy.

Appearing against 40 persons on trial before Federal Judge George M. Houston, of Montana, in the so-called second Olmsted conspiracy case, Alfred M. Hubbard, 46, dismissed federal agent and admitted principle in the rum running yesterday, told of a conference which he and several alleged whiskey smugglers were said to have had with Captain Dodge in 1925 while Dodge was commanding the coast guard in the North Pacific.

Protection Alleged
Captain Dodge gave verbal assurances, Hubbard declared that the coast guard would lay off Olmsted boats so that there would be no danger of getting into trouble.

Dodge Issues Denial
SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 20 (AP).—Captain Frederick G. Dodge, retired coast guard commandant of the Northwestern district denied emphatically today that he ever promised or could promise protection to any smuggler.

Price Tendency In Wall Street Is Reactionary

NEW YORK, Oct. 20 (AP).—Reactionary price tendencies continued to predominate in today's stock market, despite repeated efforts of pools and others to rally the general list. Declines in many of the popular industrials and railroad stocks ran from 1 to 3 points, with a few high priced specialties selling off as much as 4 to 5 points.

Persistent liquidation of many investment issues, such as United States Steel common, American Telephone, General Motors, General Electric, Westinghouse, New York Central, Union Pacific and Canadian Pacific all of which touched new lows on the current downswing, had a disturbing effect on sentiment. Commercial and industrial issues 3 points to a new low at 2 1/2, and Case Thrashing Machine fell nearly 5 points.

The closing was weak. Unloading of high priced shares, Westinghouse, Chesapeake and Ohio, U. S. Cast Iron Pipe, Dupont, Atlantic Coast Line, General Electric, International Telephone and General Railway Signal crumbling 4 to 6 points, to undermine the list in the late afternoon when the lowest prices of the session were reached. General Motors moved around the 120 and U. S. Steel the 140 levels. Total sales approximated 2,300,000 shares.

Market Steady And No Change in Price Noted

PORTLAND, Oct. 20 (AP).—Wholesale prices on butter, eggs, country dressed meats and live poultry were generally steady today with yesterday's quotations and trading in all these products were sufficiently active locally to absorb new receipts arriving on the market. Yesterday's advance on choice veal to 17 and 18c per pound was being maintained in early transactions.

Dairy exchange listings on butter and eggs remain unchanged, since the exchange held no session yesterday afternoon.

A new lot of Concord grapes from near Milwaukee was being offered at 4c per pound. Tokays, Magnums and Corvasons were quoted at \$1.50 per box. Small blue "Zinfandels" were offered by several houses at \$1.10.

Wheat Heavy and Lower at Close

CHICAGO, Oct. 20 (AP).—Starting at 1/4 to 1/2c decline, wheat held near to initial figures. Corn opened unchanged to 1/2c off and later receded all around. Oats were easy. Provisions tended down-grade.

Wheat closed heavy, 1 1/2 to 1 3/4c net lower; corn 1/4 to 1/2c down; oats 1/2 to 3/4c off and provisions unchanged to a setback of 1/2c.
