

BUMPER CROP OF APPLES IN IDAHO

Payette Valley Shows Prosperity — Shortage of Cars Hurts Emmett

PAYETTE, Ida., Oct. 21.—Signs of prosperity were never so evident throughout this valley as at present, while growers continue to utilize all available local help, as well as hundreds from the outside, in harvesting the most profitable crop of apples ever grown in the valley. While unusually fine weather has prevailed through the fall season, so that little or no time has been lost, still the need of help is reported urgent. Many orchards have crews working on Sunday, while night shifts in the

packing houses are quite common. Apple pickers also have been reaping a harvest, through the excellent quality of fruit and high wages paid for picking. The season began with a schedule of 5 cents per basket, which has increased in many instances to 6 cents, with some offers of 7 and 8 cents reported, where trees are high and picking conditions more difficult.

CAR SHORTAGE HURTS

EMMETT, Ida., Oct. 21.—The movement of the apple crop from the Emmett district to the markets has been abruptly halted this week by the shortage of refrigerator cars. As a result the packing houses and the storage facilities at the various orchards are filled to their utmost capacity. The picking has gone forward, however, and orchardists report that the harvesting will be finished within the next week or 10 days. The splendid weather of the past few weeks has been most favorable

Prices have been very satisfactory and for the greater part of the shipments cash has been paid upon delivery at the car, thus giving the growers immediate use of the money. This has given a stimulus to all lines of trade and conditions are reported to be the best in several years by the merchants.
