CUBS TRIM COVE ELEVEN, 19 TO 7

The Tiger Cubs gave La Grande their first football victory of the season yesterday afternoon when they trounced the Cove High school team by a score of 19 to 7 in a spirited game on the local gridiron.

The Cubs fought an uphill battle during the first three quarters but in the last period showed over two touchdowns and outplayed the visitors decisively. Until that last quarter, however, the contest was about even with Cove having a point the better in the score.

La Grande kicked off to Cove and on the fifth play, after about 25 yards advance in four plays, a Cove pass netted 40 yards and a touchdown. A second pass counted for an extra point.

It was in the second period before La Grande scored, when a 50-yard advance, including a 26-yard run on a forward pass, brought in a touchdown. The kick for extra point failed and the score remained La Grande 6, Cove 7 until the fourth quarter.

A consistent advance, largely featuring line smashes by Conley, caused the third touchdown of the game and shortly afterwards Cove, out, moved a pass and went 20 yards for the Cubs third score. Evans kicked goal.

The game was featured by more or less spectacular plays, including some long passes, many of which were successful.

The high school band, in its first appearance at a football game, drew considerable applause from the crowd.

W. S. C. Freshmen Wallop Oregon Babes 28 to 0

PENDLETON, Oct. 22 (AP)—A well drilled Washington State freshman football eleven defeated a weak Oregon first-year team here yesterday afternoon 28 to 0. The Cougar youngsters displayed more power in attack, better defensive ability and better judgment of plays and fundamentals and were never in danger of having their goal line crossed. They scored twice in the first period on Oregon errors on receiving plays, two being muffed and missing the Cougar youngsters in position to score.

The Pullman eleven scored again in the second quarter on some brilliant sweeps and a pass and again in the fourth period on excellent off-stumble and end runs. Oregon's only threat came in the third and fourth periods when they were fairly successful with a passing attack, but most of their gains were in midfield.

Ellington, Cougar punter, averaged 50 yards on his several kicks, considerably outpacing the Oregon booter.

The center of the Oregonian line checked the Cougar advance, but the ends crumpled under a withering drive and the backs were mediocre, with the exception of Kitzmiller at fullback, who bore the brunt of the punting and passing attacks.

In the far western conference, St. Mary's and Nevada clash at San Francisco with the Saints greatly favored to romp home with the victory.

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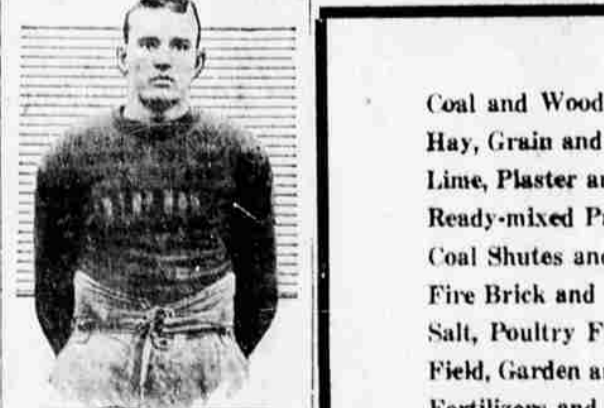
