BREAKFAST—Grapes, cereal, cream, ham toast, oven toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Potatoes baked and stuffed, celery hearts, date bread, baked quinces with cream, milk, tea.

DINNER—Savory tongue, rice potatoes, corn croquettes, tomato and cabbage salad, Spanish cream, milk, coffee.

Quinces, being kin to the apple family, can be used in almost any of the ways apples are used. Of course the texture of the quince is coarser than that of the apple so it will require longer cooking. Baked quinces are pared and cut in quarters and simmered in boiling water until tender but not

broken. They are then placed in a baking dish, sprinkled with sugar and baked in the water in which they were cooked until the syrup is thick and the fruit is a rich red.

Savory Tongue

One fresh beef tongue, ½ cup seeded raisins, 2 tablespoon lemon juice, 1 tablespoon salt, 1 cup strained tomato juice.

Cover tongue with cold water and bring to the boiling point. Skim and add salt. Simmer until tongue is tender. Remove from kettle and peel off skin. Roll in flour and brown quickly on all sides in hot fat in a frying pan.

Put into a casserole, sprinkle with raisins and pour in lemon juice and strained tomato. Cover and bake forty minutes in a moderate oven. Serve on a hot platter with any of the sauce remaining in the casserole. Slice crosswise to serve.
