Semi-Annual Meet Of Presbytery Is Held at Halfway

Rev. Harris, of Burns, Elected Moderator; The Rev. J. George Walz Gives Address

The semi-annual meeting of the Grande Ronde presbytery of the First Presbyterian church was held at Halfway this week, with all ministerial members of the presbytery, which includes Baker, Union and Walla Walla counties, in attendance.

The meeting opened Tuesday evening and the retiring moderator, the Rev. David Oatler, pastor of the Mt. Vernon Presbyterian church delivered the sermon, after which the Rev. Samuel Harris, minister of the Presbyterian church at Burns, was elected as new moderator. The Rev. William Baird, Sunday school missionary of Baker, was elected stated clerk for a term of three years.

Rev. Walz Talks
On Wednesday evening an interesting program was given. The Rev. J. George Walz, pastor of the First Presbyterian church here, giving an address on the 125 years of missions in the United States. The Rev. W. P. Shields, pastor of the Walla Walla church, spoke on the 50 years of missionary work in Alaska, and the Rev. Mr. Thompson, of Portland, syndical executive, spoke on the financial progress of missions.
